THE RIGHT TRACK

Some time ago the Del Norte Triplette proposed that Grants Pass and Crescent City work out some means of getting in closer touch with each other as the welfare of both cities relies to some extent upon the efforts of the other. The Courier answered that Grants Pass had always been and will continue to be in favor of any cooperation between the two towns that will prove mutually beneficial. A suggestion has been made by the Crescent City paper that is worthy of further consideration. The Triplette article follows:

"Soon as the holidays have been disposed of and better weather prevails, we will take up the get-together proposition in a meeting of the Chamber of Commerce where we can work at some tangible program for future cooperation.

"The secretary of the Grants Pass Chamber of Commerce has written our secretary in which he says that the text of the Triplette's editorial has always been close to the hearts of the people of Grants Pass and he assures us that they are right with us in anything we suggest.

"We believe the Grants Pass Courier has said it. Let's have a joint meeting soon as spring weather permits. There's nothing like rubbing elbows and exchanging ideas to bring out the best there is in us.

"Grants Pass has a new irrigation project and we have a breakwater under construction. Why not have an inter-city and inter-state dedication week? Three days here and three days at Grants Pass, and make it the biggest week that was ever celebrated in this section of the country. We have time to prepare and our projects are big enough and worthy enough to warrant our best effort and lots of it. To make the big thing of it that it really is, will take some time, some talk and the real cooperation of both communities and the one way to assure its success is to actually plan it, then seek ways and means for executing the plans."

OFFICIAL MESSAGES TO BE HANDLED FREE

Paris, Dec. 28.—(A. P.)—In turning over informally the new Lafayette wireless station to the French government a few days ago, the American government has proposed that the station receive and send official messages, both French and American, gratuitously for an indefinite time.

These would include, first, messages from the departments of the American government, particularly war, navy, state and commerce, to their representatives and bureaus in France; second, official messages from the American government to the French government; third, dispatches to the United States government wireless stations from its representatives in France.

In return the United States promises that the Annapolis station will perform the same service for the French government, free of charge. This large amount of business is now being handled by the private cable and commercial wireless companies.

This suggested innovation, which originated with the navy department, is being seriously considered by the French government although it believes it would carry by far the larger load, and although it had planned to leave the station entirely free during peace time to handle only commercial business. The wireless stations of the French government are used by the ministry of posts and telegraphs during peace-time and by the ministry of war during time of war.

The Lafayette station, which is 20 miles from Bordeaux, is now actually being operated by the French ministry of posts, and sent to North and South America most of the press reports of the meeting of the league of nations assembly at Geneva.

The station was started during the war by the American navy department and at the armistice the French government arranged with the navy to finish it, agreeing to pay the entire cost of construction. It can reach any point on the globe.

OHIO FOOTBALL TEAM IS STRONG ON FINISH

Columbus, Ohio, Dec. 28.—(A. P.)—When the University of California football eleven meets the Ohio State team at the Tournament of Roses in Pasadena, Cal., New Year's Day, the Pacific coast champions will play against an aggregation which has shown itself as probably the greatest "finishers" in modern football history.

"Watch the clock" is a slogan which developed among Ohio State's opponents as the Western Conference season progressed for the opposition coaches soon learned that while their proteges might hold Ohio State at bay through nine-tenths of the game, the conference champions could not be stopped in the last few minutes of play.

Followers of "Big Ten" football, when watching Ohio State play, generally want to the game convinced that for at least three quarters the Buckeyes would play a disappointing game, full of poor football, but that as the time for the final whistle approached, they would gradually become a super football machine which always managed to get in its victorious work just a few seconds before the clock hands reached the time when the game must end. Thus the "watch the clock" slogan came into being.

The reputation of being great finishers was borne out by the record of the past season. Ohio State played five conference teams and in four of the games faced defeat until the final minutes, or seconds, of play, but each time came through with a spurt of perfect football which brought victory and the conference championship to the representatives of the presidential state.

Primitive Pottery.

Many primitive races seem to have begun their pottery before it was known in order to get a glossy surface, and in other cases the surface was decorated with resinous substances, which were often colored. There are only four kinds of glaze. Those used by the Egyptians, Syrians and Persians were of alkaline type and most uncertain in their workings. Lead glaze is one of the best and most widespread in use for ordinary purposes.

Porcelain Ware.

There is nothing so effective as gaso line to clean porcelain tubs and wash basins. A dry rag dipped in gasoline, then rubbed on the surface, will remove practically any discoloration or stain. Marks which will not come off, though scrubbed with cleaning powders and soaps, vanish like magic at the touch of gasoline.
