Thousands of cars of produce now ready for the market and which crops were planted before the rate advances were made are now held at producing point because they can not be transported to market and sold at present prices and return the producer his cost of growing and packing, to say nothing of any profit for his year's work.

instead of long-haired theorists in railroad circles who figure out the added cost of freight on a pair of silk hose from New York to Chicago, they should have men in charge who can see that the saving of their perishable freight tonnage is of far more importance to the public and themselves than is a learned thesis upon the cost of a silk handkerchief and the relation of the freight rate thereto.
