THE JUDICIAL DISTRICT

A bill has been introduced in the senate to constitute each county in the state a circuit court district, instead of having one judge preside over a district that contains two or more counties. The argument used against such a bill is that it would increase the number of judges and therefore increase the amount of salary paid. The advantages to come from the passage of the measure and the savings in other directions, however, will more than offset the salary increase. As it now is, prisoners are held for long periods in the county jails awaiting the coming of the judge and the holding of a term of court, an injustice to the prisoner who is entitled to a speedy hearing,
