## LEGISLATURE URGES RELIEF FOR NEAR EAST

Salem, Feb. 8.—(A. P.)—President Ritner and Speaker Bean today introduced a joint memorial to congress urging Near East relief. The resolution was passed under suspension of the rules. The senate passed Ritner's bill providing that number one wheat shall be based on 58 pounds to the bushel to prevent buyers purchasing on 60 pound basis and exporting on 58 pound basis. It also passed two bills on banking and trust companies; Porter's bill to regulate the sale and classification of imported eggs, and house bill fixing methods of determining newspaper circulation for county court publications.
