THE REAPPORTIONMENT FIGHT

Just how sweetly Josephine and Jackson counties can keep their respective dispositions should they be tied up in a common senatorial district is given forceful demonstration by the outbreak in the senate last week.

Parliamentary chicanery enabled proponents of the vicious redistricting bill to win a narrow victory in the senate in the preliminary battle on that measure Friday.

The steam roller was trundled along with President Roy W. Ritner as engineer and all five members of the senate re-apportionment committee shoveling in the coal.

It was a short, intense battle over adoption of an amended report of the special committee and a motion to defer it until Saturday.

The political ambitions of several members were rubbed in the fracas. Smith's attitude is said to have a bearing on a subsequent possibility of appointment as collector of customs.

HIGHER EDUCATION FOR JAPANESE WOMEN

Tokio, Feb. 21.—(A. P.)—The problem of Japanese women seeking higher education is not to demand that the doors of the Imperial university be opened to them but to improve and raise the standards of their present schools so that they will be prepared for entrance to the university.

"At present," says Mrs. Fitch, "the schools for girls here are in many respects excellent, but they do not go high enough in their work. The girl who is graduated from them is not equipped to enter the Imperial university, but should have further training."

The movement for the admission of women to the higher schools is rapidly gaining momentum, the American educator thinks.

"My motives have been impugned by some of the senators and I have been accused of being a double-crosser, especially by Senator Thomas, who is an expert in that line. These statements I refute and assert that I have been sincere."

Josephine Officers' Salaries—A bill introduced in the senate on the 16th had for its purpose the increasing of the salaries of the assessor and the school superintendent. It provided for an increase of the assessor's salary from \$1400 to \$1500 per year, and of the school superintendent from \$1200 to \$1500, and also provided on the submission of the question of the increases to the people of the county at the next election. The senate calendar indicates that the bill has been laid upon the table. Assessor Hays states that, though he did circulate a petition seeking an increase of the salary of his office, the present bill is far from satisfactory, and that he should ask that it be defeated in the house if it had passed the senate.

MILLIONS WERE SAVED BY FOREST AIR PATROL

New York, Feb. 21.—(A. P.)—Airplane patrols guarding national forests saved approximately \$35,000,000 worth of standing timber from forest fires, during the last season, according to a report of the Manufacturer's Aircraft association made public today.

Between 900 and 1,000 fires were reported by patrols from airplanes loaned to the forest service by the army air service. Most of these fires, it was said, were extinguished by ground forces working under direction of the air patrols.
