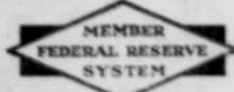

Farm Work Is Rushed—

Farm work is now progressing rapidly in most districts, and many acres of new alfalfa will go in the ground during the next few weeks, the first seedings of the legume to be made early in March. Many early gardens are also being made.

Spoke of Oregon Wildflowers—

Prof. Sweetzer, of the department of botany at the University of Oregon, spoke to the pupils of the high school this morning upon the wild flowers of Oregon. Of particular interest in the talk was the statement that many of Oregon's most beautiful wild flowers were following the buffalo and the beaver, and were becoming practically extinct, and he urged action to preserve and to propagate these more rare flowers. He also advocated the clustering of the wild flowers, shrubs, and trees of Oregon along the highways. From here Prof. Sweetzer left for Medford where he will deliver an address on care of the highways before a Medford organization.

Doc Tells 'em of Gold—

"The Grants Pass district has experienced the best mining season in years, and everyone is expecting to make a good cleanup," said Dr. W. H. Flanagan, well-known physician of that city, yesterday. Other lines, aside from the lumber industry, have likewise been active, according to Dr. Flanagan. Real estate, especially ranch property, has been in demand, and much selling and trading has been taking place during the past few months. New people have been arriving to locate in the district and business conditions in general have shown a hopeful trend, Dr. Flanagan thinks. Fruit prospects for the coming year are good in practically every line so far as crops are concerned if prices and market conditions adjust themselves by the time the season is at hand. Building in Grants Pass, in common with other places throughout the state, has not yet assumed the proportions that conditions warrant. Dr. Flanagan is registered at the Imperial.—Oregonian.
