able to add the oil.

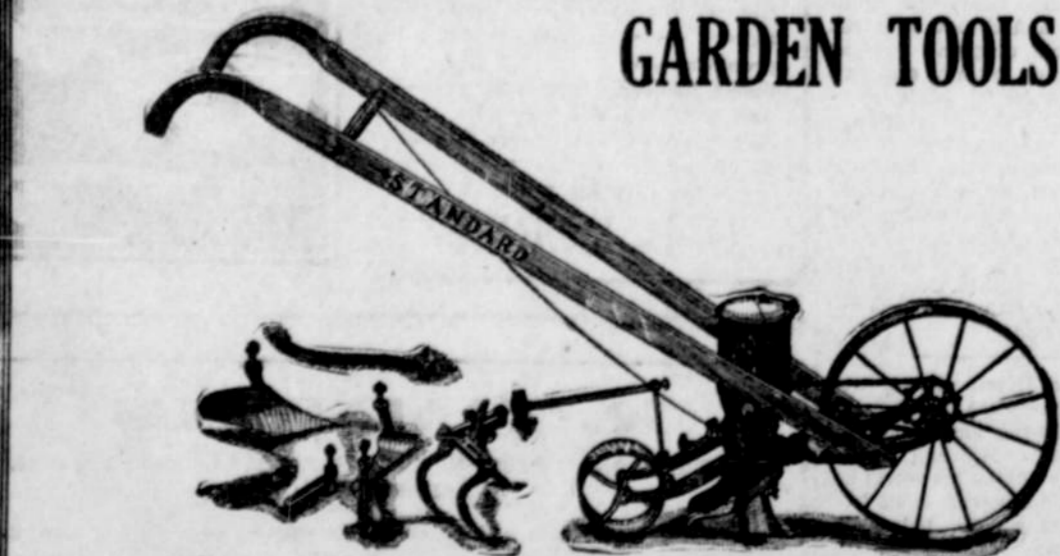
