Resume Pacific Highway Paving—

N. J. Drew, superintendent of maintenance for the state highway department, who has been in this district for several days, left last night for his head quarters at Salem. While here he directed the resump-

tion of operations on the Pacific highway between Rogue River and Gold Hill, where Schell and Calvert have a contract. The firm commenced Thursday the laying of the pavement upon the grade which was made ready for it last fall. It is expected that the pavement between the two points, five miles of which is still in an uncompleted condition, will be ready for travel by July 31st. The pavement now being laid by Schell & Calvert is in the Foothills district.

Let Contract Next Tuesday—

The state highway commission will meet next Tuesday in Portland and will let a number of contracts, included in which will be a number of interest in Josephine county. The 14-mile stretch of pavement from Wolf Creek to Galeaville will be one of the jobs to be contracted at that time, the grade now being ready to receive the pavement on that stretch. Two bridges will also be contracted one over Wolf Creek on the Pacific Highway, and the other over Deer creek on the Crescent City highway.

Eighty Thousand Tenants Seeking to Take Law in Own Hands.

Many soviets have been established in the Ganges valley in India and numerous riots have taken place, according to reports received in London. Village soviets were formed, and the tenants, encouraged by radical agitators, resorted to violence.

More Irrigation Machinery—

Another car load of the machinery equipment for the Savage Rapids dam arrived last night, and will be delivered at the dam without delay. Included in the shipments received during the week from the **Allis-Chalmers** company of Milwaukee are three of the most modern centrifugal pumps ever constructed, these being direct connected to turbines, the two turbines which will operate them being of 1050 horse power each. Two of the pumps are of 24-inch size, the third being 30-inch. To operate the turbines to capacity will require 330 second feet of water for each, and the water raised into the ditches will be 210 second feet, the gravity canal carrying 100 second feet.
