and rendering every assistance possible to have the funds made available at once.

Mr. Sabin made it particularly plain that no one from this district had made any suggestion as to the route to be followed in reaching the caves, but that this had been left entirely up to the forestry people and the state commission.

The reports brought back by the visitors to the mining convention were particularly pleasing, as it is evident that the display made from this county rivalled any like display ever put up in the west.

Fred Fritz, mining man from Portland, with interests in Josephine mines, was particularly enthusiastic over the showing made, and stated that fully one-half the people in the auditorium, where the convention was held, at any one time, could be found around the Josephine display.

The Chamber of Commerce expressed its thanks to the mining men who had made available the \$30,000 to \$40,000 worth of gold in the Portland show, a rising vote being taken.

Dr. Planagan suggested that the greatest advertisement for the mining resources of the district would be the sending of such a display as the one shown in Portland to the mining congress to be held in Chicago this fall, and he urged that some way be found to maintain this bulletin and high grade specimens in the eastern shows.

Washington, Apr. 11.—(A. P.)—Secretary of Labor Davis said that he had "no doubt" but that Donald O'Callaghan, lord mayor of cork, would reship for home as an alien seaman within 60 days from the date of the state department ruling that he was not entitled to asylum as a political refugee. O'Callaghan may be deported any time after June 5 if he does not leave before that time.
