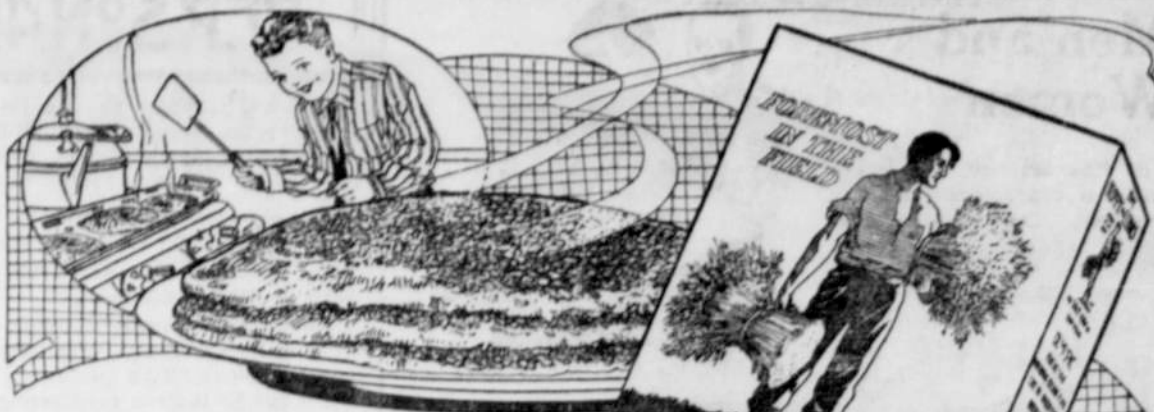

the private agreements of operators to maintain uniform sales contracts, the breaking of contract deliveries, the refusal to sell direct to consumers and also to retailers who were not members of the retailers' association, and the inflation of prices, especially by "pretended sale and distribution" through sales agencies "separate only in name from the operating and production companies."

The indictments were returned after an almost continuous investigation by the government for 18 months.

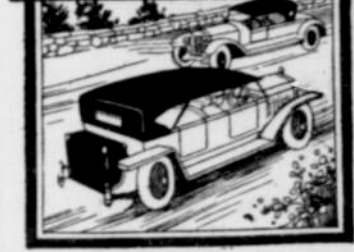
