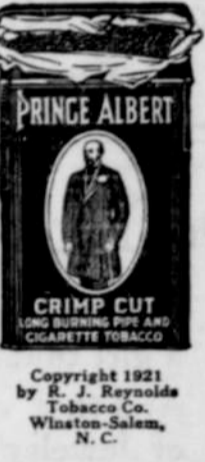

## HIGH LIGHTS IN THE TOUR

(Continued from Page One)

found the most valuable deposits of pebble phosphates in the world. After breakfast, served in a newly erected storehouse at the mine, we were put aboard flat cars on which railings had been built for safety, and taken to the mines where the hydraulic mining of phosphate was in progress, the workings reminded me of Josephine county hydraulic mining. The later processes, however, were much different. In the mining operations fossils of land animals are found, including mastodon, rhinoceros, horse and land turtles. Marine fossils, crocodile teeth, vertebra and bone and the teeth of shark and ray.

Adjoining the mine is a fine stock farm where "Cherry King," a boar valued at \$2500 and weighing 1080 pounds was seen, a hog in great contrast to the Florida razor back. At this point commenced the 126-mile motor trip, the automobiles having already been driven 25 miles or more from Lakeland to meet us.

The trip was through miles of bearing oranges and grape fruit groves, and through other miles of newly planted citrus groves. The schedule included the towns of Homeland, Fort Meade, Frostproof, Hill Crest, Lake Wales, Dundee, Hamilton, Winter Haven and Lucerne, and past many picturesque lakes. At noon a stop was made at the beautiful Mountain Lake club for lunch. The club is the community house in the center of a tract owned by Wisconsin or Minnesota people, and is located near one of Florida's "highest points." At Winter Haven an immense citrus packing plant was visited and at Lucerne dinner was served at a great packing house. There were speeches and booster talks, and here as well as elsewhere through the state the song leader found occasion to lead the company in the appropriate song: "We believe you; we believe you; we believe you just now," and also the one set to the same tune but the wording changed to "You're a liar; you're a liar, etc." Nothing could be more disconcerting to a speaker than to have several hundred of the audience burst forth in song with such frank expressions as the above. There were many other very appropriate songs for use along the way.

The special train arrived at Lakeland again the following morning and a half day spent in visiting and automobiling through the beautiful section of central Florida.
