Paris, May 19.—(A. P.)—X-rays pass through brick walls and have injured persons in buildings adjoining laboratories, members of the Academies of Sciences have just been told by Professor Contremoulin, a radiograph expert. He advised that X-ray laboratories be completely enclosed in lead sheeting a quarter of an inch thick. It has been found, Dr. Contremoulin said that rays sufficiently powerful to be useful in treating cancer, have affected persons in rooms on the other side of thick walls and in apartments above and below the radiograph room.
