COUNTY AGENT NOTES

A proposed herd law for Fruitdale precinct has just come to the attention of the livestock men. This precinct composes a large area, including not only the Fruitdale district proper, but also Jerome Prairie to the Applegate river.

Should such a law become effective requiring all owners of livestock to keep their stock enclosed or herd them, it will deprive the livestock men not only of the thousands of acres of open range in the Fruitdale district, but the thousands of acres of range in the Murphy, Williams and upper Applegate sections. This is due to the fact that cattle turned out to the range in any of the latter mentioned sections will within time work on to the Fruitdale range. This means practically wiping out the beef cattle industry of these sections. The tax revenue in Josephine county for 1921, according to the assessor's report, from cattle was \$148,000. The above districts contribute materially to this revenue. If this source of revenue is largely cut off, it will mean that the deficit created thereby must be made up by heavier taxes.
