on an already top heavy tax program. This should cause each member of the Fruitdale precinct to stop and think before voting on this measure.

No gain is ever made but at some expense, and there is no question but that cattle at large cause inconveniences and annoyance to farmers, and the public at times, but when we stop to think that Josephine county contains an area of 1751 square miles and of this area approximately only 25,000 acres are under cultivation or about 2 per cent of the entire area, we see that the passage of herd laws in a county such as this is not only unwise but impracticable. It should further be remembered that grazing cattle help to keep down many weeds and secure feed that would otherwise go to waste. This waste feed is changed into beef and when marketed brings capital back to Josephine county, helps defray taxes and makes a living for a Josephine farmer.
