In cases where the condemned start
a hunger strike with refusal to eat
any food during the week decreed as
time for execution. Another question
asked was whether "the average man
would not rather die with his facul-
ties alert, meeting death as a man
rather than as a dumb brute."
The Hanging of Casey
No answers were given these ques-
tions. When they will be answered
in actual experience of a man or
woman waiting death cannot be told,
for none is waiting death at the pres-
ent time.
Nevada has not exacted a death
penalty since 1913. With the privi-
lege of electing the form of death,
either shooting or hanging, a man
known only as Casey was hanged in
that year. No one has ever learned

Casey's real identity. He was known
only as Casey when arrested for murder;
he went through his trial alone
and friendless as Casey; he was hanged
by the neck until dead as Casey.
There was but one outstanding fea-
ture of his case. Casey had only one
leg, the missing member being re-
placed with a wooden leg. He was
asked a few days before being hanged
whether he would die with or
without his wooden leg. He said:
"Without it." On the morning of
the final day he decided he wanted
his wooden leg to go with him. This
necessitated a last minute refiguring
of weights and length of drop, but
his desire was granted, and Casey
went to his death without parting
company from his wooden leg.

STATE WILL "PLANT"
FRENCH BULLFROGS

Portland, Ore., June 7.—(A. P.)—
Lakes and marshes of Oregon will be
stocked before long with French bull-
frogs, the legs of which are declared
by gastronomic experts to be a deli-
cacy.
A. E. Burgdoff, state game warden,
announced that he had received six
dozen of the frogs from the Idaho
state game commission. These six
dozen will be protected by the game
commission until they have multi-
plied sufficiently to begin stocking
waters in the vicinity of Portland,
and in other parts of the state.

CAMP 55 READY TO
SEND AID TO PUEBLO

Rogue River Camp Number 55, of
the Woodmen of the World, has sent
a message asking if the camp may
aid the homeless in the flooded city
of Pueblo, Colorado. The telegram
was as follows:
"Frank P. Hawke, head manager
W. O. W., Pueblo, Colorado.
"Rogue River Camp 55 regrets to
learn of the great misfortune occa-
sioned by the recent inundation. We
stand ready to respond to any call.
"A. K. CASS, clerk."

The W. O. W. is said to be the
largest order in Pueblo, with three
camps and 2700 members. The W.
O. W. committee rushed tents and
provisions from Denver, and a tent
city is now sheltering the homeless.
One camp is composed entirely of
railroad men, among the homes of
whom much of the damage was done.
From \$50,000 to \$75,000 will be paid
by the order to the beneficiaries of
deceased members of the Pueblo
camps.
