ADVANTAGEOUS BOND SALE
At a meeting of the board of directors of the Grants Pass Irrigation district held yesterday, the Grants Pass and Josephine bank, acting for the Anglo and London Paris National bank of San Francisco, purchased \$325,000 par value of the bonds of the district, this being the amount estimated necessary for the completion of the project according to present plans.

The bid made by the bank was at 90 cents and accrued interest. The board will still hold \$100,000 of the bonds of the last issue authorized by the voters, this to cover the cost of the excavation of the main canal when this work is undertaken. Delivery of the bonds sold yesterday is to be made as the funds are needed from month to month, though it is expected that the project will have been completed by the end of September. The sale of the Grants Pass district bonds was at the most advantageous figure reported by any irrigation district in Oregon recently, other late sales having been reported as low as 80 cents. This sale completes the financing of the district, and assures the cash being available to meet all claims against the district as they arise.

The contractors expect to make a material saving for the district over the estimates, and it is hoped that not all of the present block of bonds will be required.

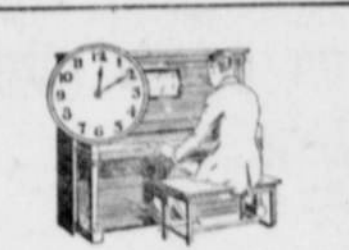
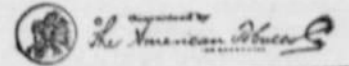

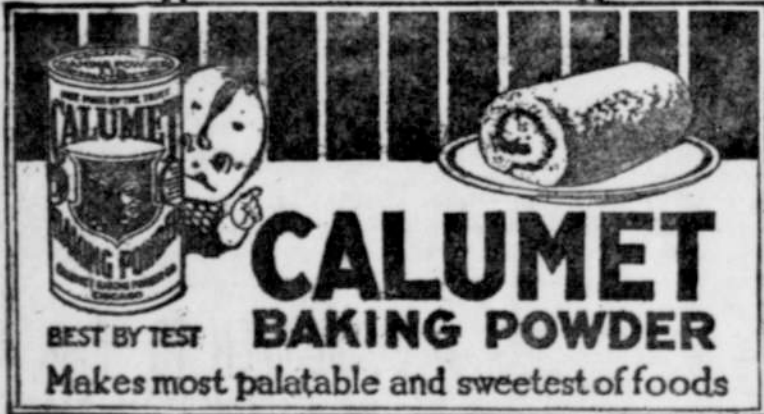
