"The road to Crater Lake will be opened July 1st. The construction work between Agate and Trail is over a new line so that traffic on the roads used last year is not interfered with. A sprinkling truck will be used south of Prospect so that the road to Prospect will be as good or better than last year. From Prospect to the lake the new grade completed last year is to be used. There are several alternate routes leading out of Medford. Detour signs will be placed on all of these before July 1st.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS

Sealed proposals for constructing the Oregon Caves National Forest road project located within the Siskiyou National Forest, State of Oregon, County of Josephine, will be received by the District Engineer, Bureau of Public Roads, U. S. Department of Agriculture, at 204 Postoffice Building, Portland, Oregon, until 10 o'clock a. m. July 5, 1921, at which time and place they will be publicly opened and read. The right is reserved to reject any and all bids, and none will be considered except those from contractors ascertained to be experienced and responsible. The length of the project to be constructed or improved is approximately 8.5 miles, and the principal items of work are approximately as follows: 30 acres of clearing, 95,000 cubic yards of excavation, 135 feet of timber trestle, 2400 feet of culverts, 1 40-foot timber truss on concrete abutments. The work embraced in this contract shall be completed within 180 weather working days, following the execution of the contract by the Secretary of Agriculture. The Bureau of Public Roads will furnish the successful bidder for use in constructing or improving this road available equipment at the prices and on the terms set forth in the proposal form. The contract form and the maps, plans, specifications and estimate of quantities may be examined by responsible contractors at the engineer's camp on the project. Plans will be ready for distribution June 27, and may be examined after that date at 204 Postoffice Building, Portland, Oregon, and at the office of the Forest Supervisor, Grants Pass, Oregon. Plans and specifications will be furnished contractors who contemplate bidding, upon deposit of a certified check for ten dollars, payable to the Secretary of Agriculture of the United States. Check will be returned upon return of plans and specifications. All proposals must be made on forms, and in accordance with instructions forming a part of the specifications above referred to, and must be accompanied by a proposal guarantee in an amount at least equal to five (5) per cent of the total amount of the proposal.
