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GRANTS PASS AND THE PEACE RESOLUTION

The influences of war extend into channels not seen at first glance. The batteries of the Huns were silenced many months ago, but it required the signature of President Harding last Saturday to the peace resolution to end a technical state of war between the United States and Germany. Swords were sheathed during the period between the armistice and the peace resolution, but the effect of the state of war was pronounced in many directions. Here in Grants Pass, for instance, industrial progress awaited the coming of peace, for when war came industry must give its energy to the winning of battles.

The battle which Grants Pass undertook to win in 1915 was an industrial one. She had previously bonded herself for \$200,000 to be expended in the construction of the first unit of the railroad projected toward the coast, its ultimate touch at salt water to be at Crescent City. The first unit of ten miles was built by the municipality, but in July, 1915,

a new program was outlined when a contract was entered into with the Twohy Brothers company, a contract that is now awakened from its dormant condition by the signing of the peace resolution. Under this contract the Twohy company was to build four and one-half miles of road within six months from the dating of the contract. This was built. There was a time limit of two years for the completion of the line to Waldo, forty miles from Grants Pass, but war intervened, and under the terms of the contract, its conditions rested while a state of war existed. It was not a time for building railroads unless they were part of a war-winning program. With the appending of the signature of President Harding to the peace resolution, however, the Twohy contract again becomes a live issue, and under it the Twohys will assume the interest burden upon \$200,000 bond issue if the road does not reach Waldo within the time limit. The time has still 115 days to run before the interest payments must be assumed by the Twohys.

Industrial conditions are fast assuming the normal again, and it would seem that time was near when railroad construction could be resumed and the battles of peace be won again. A condition of the contract with the Twohy company is that the company can take over the inter-

ests of the city at any time by the payment of the amount of the bond issue, \$200,000, and the assumption of the bond interest charge, when it would be relieved of the conditions of the contract. Or, under the instrument, the road can be surrendered to the city with a mortgage incumbrance to represent the money expended upon its extension by the Twohy company.

The present interest in the matter is that with the signing of the peace resolution the Grants Pass railroad situation becomes a live issue.
