Will Elect Officers—
R. A. Ward of Portland, manager of the Oregon Wool and Mohair association arrived in Medford Monday to attend the election of officers for the Southern Oregon district of the association, comprised of Jackson, Josephine and Curry counties, to be held in the public library Monday afternoon. The association now has 1600 members with 200,000 sheep signed up which is 60 per cent of the Western Oregon wool. The local district now has between 125 and 150 members, and 22,000 sheep signed up in Jackson county, which is a rather remarkable record as it includes all Jackson county sheep that appear on the tax assessment rolls.—Medford Mail-Tribune.

WIRELESS EXPERTS REPORT AUSTRALIAN MAP ERROR
Sydney, N. S. W., July 19.—(A. P.)—Australia's exact position on world maps, originally determined by Captain James Cook, the early explorer, was brought into question recently when wireless authorities, after direct checking by radio with standard time clocks at Lyons, France, said they believed there is an error of perhaps 100 yards on all maps in Australia's north-south lines.

Seafarers who first sketched Australia's position based their calculations on the chronometer, the finely-made watch which keeps Greenwich time. Corrections were made from time to time, until final checking by cable was believed to be accurate.

Lately, however, Sydney wireless men who have been listening to the clock ticks at Lyons say they have discovered there is a perceptible loss

of time in transmitting the correct seconds over the cable. This loss, it is said, led to errors in map-making.

INTERNATIONAL GOLF PLAY CARRIED TO AMERICAN LINKS

Washington, July 19.—(A. P.)—International interest in golf, which was at fever heat during the recent British championships on English and Scottish links, was renewed today when several prominent professionals entered from Great Britain and all of the leading American "pros" as well as a few of our best amateur players begin the qualifying round in this year's open championship tournament on the links of the Columbia Country Club, Chevy Chase, Md. Last year this event was decided over the course of the Inverness Club, Toledo, Ohio, and Edward Ray, representing the Oxhey Club of England, was the winner with a score of 295 for 72 holes. There were 265 entries last year but this record mark will not be touched so far as entrants go in numbers for the 1921 title as the field may not exceed 220 players.

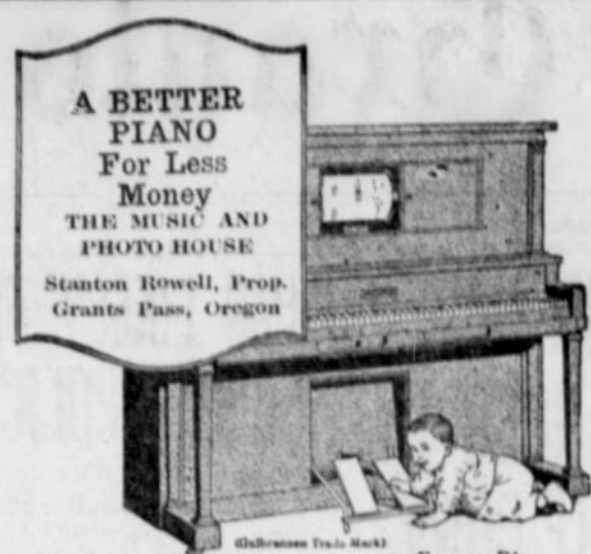
