Ore Strike Made—

After tunneling three feet further, just after a mining company had closed operations on the property, the owners of the Portland Group of mining claims near Holland, struck a vein from three to four feet wide, carrying excellent values in free gold, according to the owners. Ore was struck in 28 feet of additional tunnel, when it had not been expected

for at least 100 feet. Since the discovery of the new ore shoot, it has not been decided whether the owners will again lease their property or work the mine themselves. The strike was made Saturday night and though no assays have been made it is understood that the vein carries very good milling values. The Portland Group is west of the Boswell and one and a half miles from Holland.
