A SHIPPING WAR

Advices from England bring the news that the United States shipping board has threatened to break with the British, unless certain unfair tactics, of which the British shipping interests are accused, are ended. The ultimatum says that the shipping board "will declare an open market and haul anything, anywhere at any rate." A shipping war at this time would be very undesirable, but American interests must be protected. A rate war would follow the cutting of tariffs that would result in great losses to the shipping board and to private companies.

The shipping board controls a large amount of American shipping but by no means does it control all of it. Private interests have great sums of money tied up in enterprises that would be seriously damaged by the lowering of rates. Certain retaliatory features of the Jones bill could be used against the British shippers, but even this could not offset the losses that would result from a general lowering of tariffs. The American merchant marine is strong enough to be effective in a war with any other merchant marine, and would undoubtedly in the end win its point, but meanwhile they would have lost beyond recovery. American shipping needs bolstering up, there is little doubt of that, but a rate war could not possibly prove effective as a means of doing this. All it needs is assurance that it will have the same privileges and rights as other nations in shipping. When these rights are denied, certain measures in retaliation are all right, but a rate war should be the last to be tried.

Contract Is Awarded—

The contract for the building of the levee along the Pacific highway above the Savage Rapids dam, was awarded to Grieve and Seymour, who are moving their camp today to the new location. When the dam is finished and the water backed up, it is higher than the level of the highway. The levee will necessitate the moving of about 4800 yards of earth. Grieve and Seymour are the contractors who widened the highway and also built a portion of the south high line canal.

The engineers will agree on a route for the highway which is to be built from Crescent City to this city. Mr. Taylor has been busy getting camp established at Gasquet and will soon be able to start the survey which will take until the first of the year. The construction of the road will then begin. The road will follow up Smith river in order to eliminate the heavy grades over the mountains.
