GREAT WASTE DUE TO RUST

Almost Incalculable Damage is Done
Yearly by Its Attacks on Met-
als of All Kinds.

The greatest waster in the whole
world is rust. It costs Great Britain
alone \$32,000,000 yearly, according to
London Answers.

When the oxygen of moist air com-
bines with the sensitive surface of a
metal it produces an oxide. This is
rust and nothing else.

Aluminum is the only metal that will
not rust. Gold is generally taken to
be a rustless metal, and it is true that
it will not combine with oxygen of it-
self—without aid, that is. Given the aid,
it will rust.

Ornamental steel—that with a pur-
plish or lilac color—is the worst rust-
er, because the color tinge has been
produced by part oxidation and the
process begun artificially is continued
naturally.

Dry air will cause rust, but the
metal has to be at high temperature. A
poker which has been made red hot
will rust when it cools. Grate bars do
the same. The flakes that come from
red-hot iron when it is hammered are
but rust.

The best preventive of rust is fat-oil
varnish (one part) mixed with rectified
spirits of turpentine (five parts) and
applied with a sponge. The highest
steel polish on mathematical instru-
ments remains absolutely unaffected if
this solution is applied.

Tinware is rendered practically im-
mune from the rust fiend if when new
the ware is smeared with pure lard
and baked in a hot oven.

KNEW USE OF MOSQUITO NETS

Abundant Proof That the Ancients
Used Them to Foil the Attacks
of the Pests.

According to Col. Sir Patrick Hehir,
a physician, who has traveled about
India, lecturing to the people about
malaria, mosquito nets are by no
means a modern invention. He quotes
Herodotus, who, writing of the Egypt-
ians who dwelt on the banks of lakes,
rivers and marshes, says:

"Every man has a net with which
in the day he takes fish and at night
uses in the following manner: In what-
ever bed he sleeps he throws the net
around it, and then, getting in, sleeps
under it. If he should wrap himself
up in his clothes or in linen the
mosquitoes would bite through them,
but they never bite through the net."

The Romans called the mosquito net
a conopeum. It is spoken of by Varro,
Horace, Juvenal, Propertius and Paul-
us Silentiarius. Horace and Propertius
referred to it in a way that implies
they thought it unmanly for a hardy
Roman soldier to indulge in such pro-
tection.

Bird and Boat Collide.

A flying albatross collided with a
vessel in Australian waters with such
force that the "trigger" locking the
forward rudder was lifted, and the
rudder released. The vessel was travel-
ing at a speed of ten knots an hour at
the time, and as a result of the sudden
release of the locking gear, the rudder
took charge and caused the steamer to
sheer off her course. The engines were
quickly stopped and the whistle blown
for assistance. After a delay of about
five minutes, however, the rudder was
secured again. On a subsequent trip
the rudder was found to be damaged
and the steamer was withdrawn and
sent for repairs. The albatross, a
fine specimen, was measured by one of
the deck hands and found to cover
ten feet from tip to tip of the wings.
The skipper at first mistook the bird
for a sheet of newspaper swept off the
deck by a squall. The bird only missed
the glass-enclosed wheelhouse by a
couple of feet.
