FINN SEES BOLSHIEVKS AS MAD MEDICANTS

Heisingfors, Finland, Aug. 11.—A. P.)—Well-dressed and well-nourished visitors appearing on the streets of Petrograd are stopped in the streets by many of the inhabitants who look them up and down and ask them many questions, just as if they had dropped down from another planet, according to a Finn who was officially permitted to visit Petrograd to distribute food to scientists and literary men.

The Finn described the inhabitants of Petrograd as being like a lot of "mad mendicants" of an "unnaturally hysterical nervous pitch." He saw Kotliarevski, a member of the academy, "who came like a beggar, with faltering footsteps, to receive his modest share of the supplies." He was without a shirt and was clad in rags. Some of the scientists he found ill with scurvy. Benois, the painter, he said, is "dreaming of a piece of chocolate." Maxim Gorky and others are attempting to take care of these scientists.
