Weather for Week Cool—
The weather in the valley during the past week has been as near ideal as it is possible to have. The mercury never went above 89, hovering for the most part near 80 to 85 degrees. The nights were pleasant, one night, however, being rather cold, the mercury dropping to 43.

Not School Holiday—
The popular impression that Labor day, the first Monday in September, is a school holiday, is corrected in the last edition of the state school laws. The law says that the day shall be a legal holiday, provided that "the first Monday in September shall not be a school holiday, but a portion of said day shall be set apart and observed in the public schools of the state by appropriate exercises." There are but a few schools of the county that will be affected by this law as but one school is now in session, with several others due to start next Monday.

Many Fishermen on River—

Black Bass Planted—
Bert Anderson received a wire from Capt. A. E. Burduff, state game warden, Thursday stating that 20 cans of big mouth black bass would arrive at Ashland Friday morning to be placed in the Lake of the Woods. Mr. Anderson arranged with Supt. J. W. Berrian and local sportsmen at Ashland to take the fry to the lake. These are the first bass to be placed in this county, and will please a lot of those who like bass fishing. There will be eight or ten thousand small fry in this shipment. —Medford Mail-Tribune.

Codling Moths Out—
More codling moths are flying at this time, says County Agent Miller, and apple growers are advised that they should keep their apples well covered with spray. During the cold weather earlier in the spring the broods did not all hatch out and are just now beginning to come out. Professor Childs, of Hood River, advocates a late August or early September spray, but it is up to the individual grower whether or not his apples need spray at this time.
