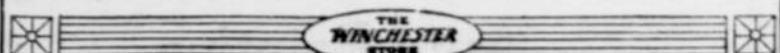

**Portland in Medford—**  
C. W. Borland, manager of the Josephine county fair was in Medford today advertising the fair. The association has secured 12 acres of land on the Rogue and are erecting permanent buildings. The fair is a county proposition and the grounds and buildings are being erected by funds secured by taxation. The fair will be held September 15 to 17 this year.—Medford Sun.

They were from seed which he had shipped from Colorado and is the variety principally grown on the Colorado western slope, and is called the Downing. Mr. Bryant states that they grow uniform in size and are a high class marketing potato. He also brought a mammoth melon from his patch. Mr. Bryant, who has been a resident of this section for the past five years, raises garden truck extensively.
