THE DECLINE IN EXPORTS

The United States is confronted with a problem in the continued decline in the export trade of the country. Exports dropped from \$3,000,000,000 to \$6,500,000,000 last year. The decline was due, according to Comptroller of the Currency Crissinger, to the fact that American money is the most expensive of any in the world.

The falling off in exports continues to back up in American markets a much larger supply of goods not needed at home. This accumulation of goods, normally raised for export, is having a disastrous effect upon the agricultural and other industries, because it renders more serious the price uncertainties of the near future on many staple goods.

To prevent any great disturbance coming to American producers and shippers. The War Finance Corporation has adopted a policy of giving larger credit relief to concerns having goods for export. The corporation has already assured to producers and export associations nearly \$100,000,000 in financial backing from government funds.

Under this plan the government is giving support to the producer and exporter, expecting that by the beginning of another year conditions will have improved, both in domestic and international trade, as a result of adjustment of some of the disorders now noted in foreign currency systems.

The program to finance the needs of farmers on products raised this year will call for heavy advances in these channels. Officials today could not estimate what sums may be needed to facilitate the operations of the farmers. But there is a firm disposition by the administration, through the medium of the Finance Corporation and the federal reserve system, to make credit more easily available to agricultural groups and to help them to keep on their feet until business becomes normal.

Where normal credit channels abroad are broken down, but there exists an excellent prospect that before long credit arrangements will be revived, the War Finance Corporation is stepping in promptly to relieve financial distress.
