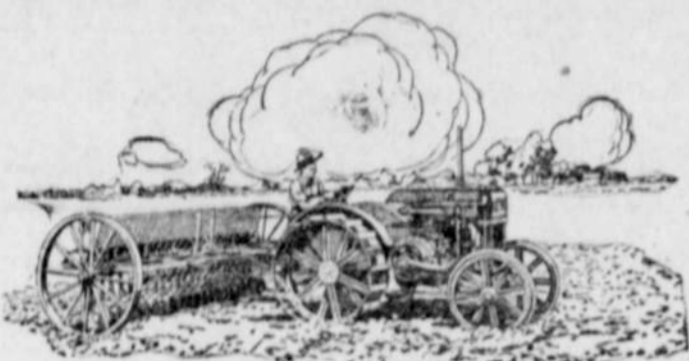

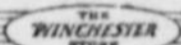

The registration of automobiles in Oregon passed the 100,000 mark on April 30, according to a statement issued by Secretary of State Koser, which shows total registrations up to closing time on that date of 100,957. This is approximately 4,500 more registrations than on the same date a year ago. Receipts of the department up to April 30, amounted to \$2,698,723 as against total receipts of \$2,334,931 for the entire year 1921.

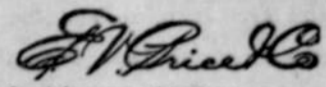
