OUR NEXT DOOR NEIGHBORS

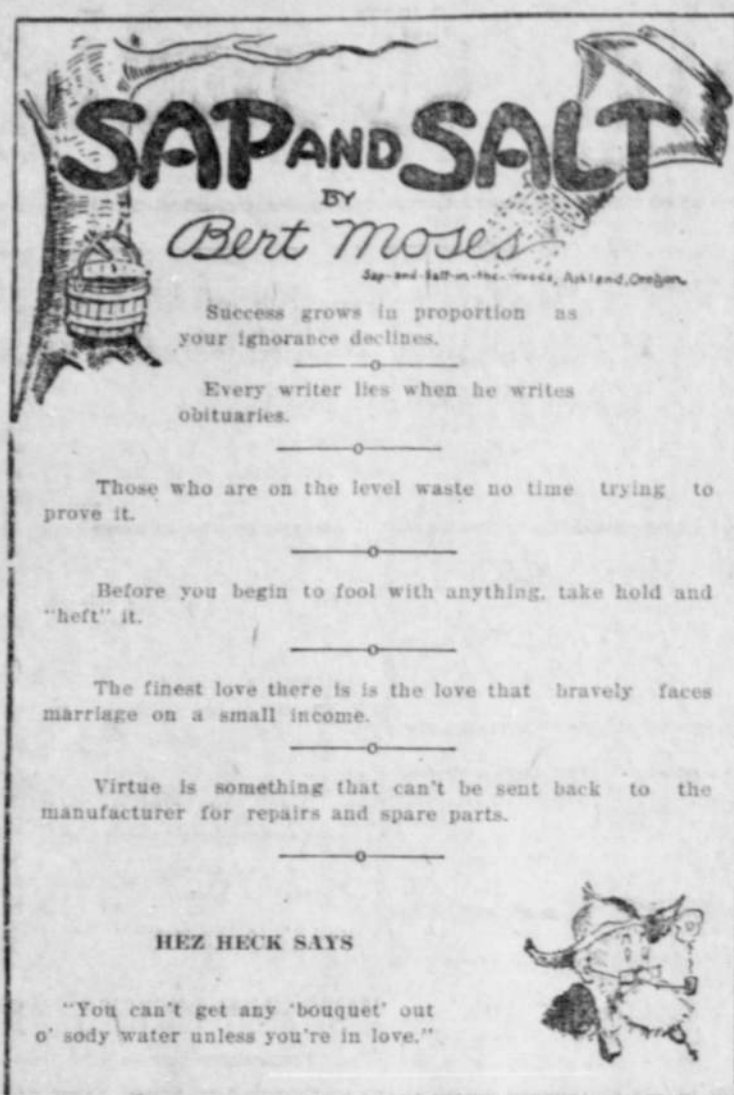
Like holding out a red cloth to an infuriated bull, is the introduction of a bill in the state legislature to the sportsmen in Jackson county, should that bill happen to pertain in any way to Rogue river. They never stop to investigate the bill to see whether it is good or bad, but, like the bull, plunge headlong at it with their sole object the defeat of that measure. Even Jackson county press does not seem to be immune from such action, for under the heading "Strangling an Asset," the Ashland Tidings prints an editorial which shows an absolute ignorance of matters pertaining to the Rogue, yet tries to enlighten its readers as to the proper attitude which should be taken.

The article states that should the Cramer measure pass, it would "kill" sport fishing in the Rogue. The aim and purpose of the bill is to make steelhead fishing better. It is true that it allows the commercial season a 25-day earlier start, but it is also true that it closes the season 60 days earlier, or in other words it lops 35 days off the present open season. Really, the editor of the Tidings should become conversant with the bill and the conditions along the Rogue, before he tries to elucidate to his readers.

"Open the Rogue river to commercialized fishing on such a basis and an automatic stop will be placed upon pleasure fishing, for few steelheads will survive the meshes and snares prepared by men who seek the fish for personal gain," proclaims the Tidings. Can it be possible that our Jackson county brethren have just awakened from a long sleep and have not yet found out that the Rogue has been opened for years to commercial fishing? It really doesn't seem possible that such ignorance could be accounted for otherwise.

And listen to this choice bit. "Where Representative Cramer obtained his ideas for the proposal of this bill is not known. Perhaps from sheer ignorance and, perhaps, through the influence of commercial fishermen, who, though limited in number, are powerful along the Rogue." One would think the ignorance lies with our next-door neighbor in Jackson county.

The Tidings article follows: "Though he lives in Grants Pass and should have the interests of his community at heart, young Representative Cramer is trying to pile up a lot of misery during his maiden appearance before the state legisla-

TENNIS COURTS ARE ASSURED

Two Will Be Made in Riverside Park
Immediately

With two tennis courts assured for Riverside park this summer, plans are now rapidly nearing completion for the organization of a tennis association in the city. Funds have been promised for the construction of the courts and the park superintendent is now busy removing four pine trees which stood in the way. The new courts are to be located on the east side of the park near the auto camp. They will face north and south, so that the sun will not interfere with the players.

The association, when formed, will have regular tournaments and an effort will be made to get players to compete with other valley towns. There are many players who have signified their desire to join in such an association and a meeting is to be called soon at the Chamber of Commerce rooms. A few hours work on the part of a few players will be needed to help in the laying out of the court and the other work incidental to the erection of the wire, and other equipment.

CALIFORNIA METALS INCREASE

Gold and Silver Output Grows During Past Year

San Francisco, Jan. 25.—(A. P.)—California's output of gold, silver, copper, lead and zinc during 1922 was valued at \$21,825,500, an increase of \$673,177 over 1921, according to the United States geological survey estimates.

Gold production was \$11,845,000, a decrease of \$859,522, due, the survey says, to the disastrous fire in the Argonaut mine at Jackson, which also shut off production in the adjoining Kennedy mine, through which work was conducted in trying to rescue the 47 miners entombed in the Argonaut mine.

The government's report states that complaint has been made of the scarcity of first class miners, who seem to have gone into more profitable and less hazardous occupations than underground mining.

Copper production in 1922 was valued at \$3,036,500, an increase of \$1,521,601. This, says the report, was remarkable in view of the low price of the metal and the fact that the Mammoth, Mountain Copper, Penn and Calaveras mines, formerly the largest producers of the red metal remained closed.

SACKS ARE USED FOR CLOTHES

Burlap Made Into Garments for the Needy of Russia

Moscow, Jan. 25.—(A. P.)—Millions of American burlap sacks which were brought to Russia filled with sugar, flour, corn or rice for the starving population are to be made into garments this winter to help relieve the famine in clothing among the poor. The sacks have been accumulating in warehouses since the American Relief Administration shipments began to arrive nearly a year and a half ago.

Experience has shown that Russian women, taught by hard times, can take three sacks and from them soon turn out a serviceable overcoat or a dress. One sack is placed inside the other, a head hole cut, and places allowed for the arms. Double sleeves and pockets are made from the third sack. For wear in cold weather the garment is made thicker by "quilting" with whatever is most handy, articles such as excelsior, rags, pieces of rope, or leather, sheared wool or tea case fibers being used. The sacks will be turned over to old people's homes, orphanages and various other institutions.

CHINESE WIZARD
NOW IN POVERTY

Noted for His Wonderful Achievements With Citrus Fruits.

PRODUCED THE GONG ORANGE

Awarded Wilder Medal for Developing Orange That Can Remain on Tree for Several Years and Maintain Its Juice and Flavor—Also Perfected Cherry Currant—Latest Achievement Was Perfumed Grapefruit—Started Chinese Republic Movement.

Leo Gim Gong, internationally known horticulturist, "president" of a "Chinese republic" and holder of the Wilder medal, awarded by the United States Department of Agriculture, is at his home at De Land, Fla., dependent upon the generosity of friends, feeble and broken, with a heavy mortgage upon his home, which for many years has been one of the show places of central Florida.

Friends in De Land are supplying his business affairs in the hope of clearing up his debts. Leo resides on his estate with "Fanny," a mare which for 20 years has been his pet and sole companion. He lives virtually the life of a hermit, and during the last 10 years has visited De Land, the nearest town, but four times.

Produced Gong Orange.

Leo has numerous horticultural accomplishments to his credit, but the best known is the Leo Gim Gong orange, perfected in 1887 by crossing the Mediterranean sweet and Hart's Lane varieties and for which he received the Wilder medal. The tree of this variety will thrive in a climate too cold for others, while the fruit will remain on the tree several years and maintain its maximum amount of juice and flavor.

In 1890 Leo investigated the grapefruit and produced a cross of the common Florida grapefruit and the trifoliate orange. The fruit is of superior quality and the tree can stand from 10 to 15 degrees lower temperature than ordinary varieties. Leo's last citrus development resulted in the perfumed grapefruit, which will permeate a house with an agreeable odor. It is a cross of the pomegranate and grapefruit.

Perfected Cherry Currant.

Leo also perfected the cherry currant in Massachusetts, a cross of the ordinary currant and the grape. In other fields, he produced an apple that ripened in July, a late peach grown under glass with the fruit ripening in November, a salmon-colored raspberry and a tomato plant that grows to a height of 15 feet.

Leo was born on a farm near Canton, China, in 1859, arrived in San Francisco in March, 1872, and went to New England, where he was employed by Solomon Burlingame of North Adams, Mass. He was adopted by an unmarried daughter of Mr. Burlingame in 1874.

Two years later Leo was elected first "president" of the "Chinese republic" at a meeting under a large chestnut tree in a cow pasture near North Adams, held in connection with the centennial celebration to commemorate the one hundredth anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence.

R. Chung, one of the members of the movement, who met with Leo, was ordered to China with the news and to launch a campaign. Chung died before he reached China, and the movement ended there, although some of the principles laid down by Leo are said to be incorporated in the laws of the present Chinese government.

When Leo's mother died the Burlingame property near North Adams was left to him, and 5 per cent of the remainder of the estate.

IS SAVED FROM DEPORTATION

Hungarian Woman, Accused as Love Pirate, Freed on Promise to Wed.

A last minute appeal by her sister, on whose charges she was about to be deported, saved Mrs. Agnes Fekete, thirty-two years, and her thirteen-year-old daughter from deportation at Cleveland, O. Mrs. Fekete and her child were about to be placed aboard a train for New York, when the sister, with whom she lived at Martins Ferry, O., since coming to the United States from Hungary, related. Seven other aliens were taken to New York.

Upon the death of her husband, Mrs. Fekete brought her daughter to live with her sister, arriving here July 22. Several months later Mrs. Fekete was accused by her sister of having won her husband's affections and ejected her from her home. She and her daughter then became public charges and were slated for deportation.

As they were about to be taken from the jail to the train to start their journey to Hungary, Mrs. Fekete's sister told immigration authorities that Mrs. Fekete would marry a man in Pennsylvania. The local Hungarian consul made the same representations for the prospective husband. The sister gave bond insuring immigration officials the proposed marriage would be carried out and the woman and her daughter were released.

Immigration authorities refused to reveal the name of the residence of the man Mrs. Fekete is to marry.
