MARKETING PLAN EVOLVED

work in close touch with the county agent's office and the merchants of the city in setting these standards, always keeping in mind the demands of outside markets to which surpluses must be sent.

The possibilities of producing specialized crops for outside shipment will be brought out by these committees, and it is hoped that it may develop that the growing of such crops as broccoli, head lettuce, and early potatoes, may develop gradually so that shipments may be handled as were the grapes the past year.

It is also hoped to work out by a survey some idea of the consumption possibilities of the local market, or in other words to let the producer know how much he can expect the merchants to purchase in the aggregate, and by this means to advise the farmer before planting time what to expect. A control of acreage in each crop will not be attempted, only through a statement to the farmers as a whole. By this means it is hoped to particularly guide the new comer from growing produce that is in danger of an over supply locally and not possible to ship to other markets. The progress and recommendations of these committees will be made public from time to time.

The program has been briefly brought to the attention of the grocers of the city lately by a survey made by the Grange Committee, and received their endorsement and support.

The farmers part in the program will be the feature of a series of marketing conferences and schools held in at least two places in the county. These will be conducted in connection with farmers organizations by the extension service, O. A. C., who have recently placed C. J. Hurd, veteran in cooperative marketing in the state at that work.

County Agent Howell said today

regarding Mr. Hurd and the whole program, "The transfer of Mr. Hurd to marketing work at this time is very gratifying, as I consider him to be one of the best informed men in the state in cooperative marketing, and on farmers problems. A man of much actual farming experience, prominent granger and farm bureau worker, he has organized five successful public markets in the state, organized the Wool Growers Association, and assisted many other organizations."

Further announcements regarding these marketing schools will be made later.

Gossip of State Correspondents at World Centers of Population

Honolulu, Jan. 29.—(I. N. S.)

The island of Oahu bears a two-thirds resemblance to Gaul in that it is for all practical purposes divided into two parts, the windward side and the leeward side. The former is chiefly given over to plantations and is typically tropical and forest primeval and hill that sort of thing. They have judges and administration of justice there, however, although, occasionally the inroads of the effete civilization from the leeward side, principally the city of Honolulu, interfere with the simple mechanics of that justice.

For instance, the Kamehameha highway, the principal road around the island, recently was closed at an important point for six weeks for repairs which the advanced thinkers of the department of public highways ordained. Judge J. K. Paele, presiding magistrate at Kanaeohoe, on the "off" side, lives at Waihole, about six miles from his court. The judge usually drives to court in an old-fashioned buggy and Dobbin, his faithful charger, makes the six miles in the dewy freshness of the morning without any trouble. Now, however, since the road has been closed at a point where no detours are possible, the judge is faced with the alternative of reaching court and getting home again by driving Dobbin 200 miles daily, around the island, or else swimming or rowing across Kaneohe Bay.

The judge came to Honolulu to consult with Mayor Wilson about the matter. The mayor suggested swimming across the bay and volunteered the information that the judge could pack his clothes in a small bundle and fasten it to his head. A rowboat didn't appeal to the judge at all. He couldn't reconcile his idea of magisterial dignity with the spectacle of himself, shirt sleeved and perspiring, laboring over the oars.

Dobbin can swim, but the buggy is not so accomplished; neither will it float. Since there is no possibility of the board of supervisors establishing an emergency ferry service, it looks as though there is a vacation in store for the judge, while the road is closed and justice all gummed up.

Coincident with the emphatic announcement of Consul-General K. Yamasaki, of Japan, that he is unqualifiedly in favor of the acceptance by Japanese residents of the new alien language school regulations, came a request from Governor W. R.
