The Simmons bill to force women
to serve on juries, and repealing the
present clause giving them the right
of exemption on any excuse offered
has been passed by the lower house
of the legislature. The records show
that outside of Multnomah county,
only one out of every seven women
supported served on juries. If the
law passes the senate it will make
jury service compulsory irrespective
of sex, and apply to the jury lists
drawn for the year.

Gossip of Staff Correspondents
at World Centers of
Population

Berlin, Feb. 8.—(I. N. S.)—The
Tiergarten is the Central Park of
Berlin. Lying in the very heart of
the city, it is the playground for
children, the trysting place for lov-
ers, who still abound in the face of
grim adversity, the scene of many
a robbery and murder, and the chosen
ground for suicide.

It is a ghostly place on these gray
winter afternoons. An uncanny gray
light filters between the trees and
through the light mist that marks
the winter season here. With the
sounds of the great unseen city that
surrounds it only faintly heard, and
only an occasional pedestrian to be
seen, one feels himself in an enchan-
ted forest.

It is so gray and gloomy—the very
embodiment of the German spirit to-
day. It is a tangible ghost story.

No wonder the desperate come
here to end their woes. One seems
so far from life in this park that
death seems scarcely a transition.
And the policeman on patrol who
finds the suicide's body simply says
"another one."

Murder and suicide are common
phenomena in the Tiergarten. A
young man, despairing of ever being
able to marry the girl he loves, and
seeing no use in continuing what
to him is a futile existence, shoots
his sweetheart and turns the gun up-
on himself. It has happened not
once, but often. That's why the po-
licemen don't register surprise any
more.

"What is the use of living?" is a
question that is often heard in Ger-
many these days. And not from the
mouths of cynics but from very sim-
ple, innocent people who in normal
times would never have even known
that there is a problem of existence.
The taxi drivers, the cooks and
housemaids, the common laborers,
as well as the starving middle class
are all asking the same question.

"What is the end of life?" these
workers ask. "Why do we have to
work so hard without reward? We
lost the war, to be sure, but is that
any reason why we should be hound-
ed off the face of the earth? What
is the use of living?"

And for many, the fact that they
can find no answer is too much to
bear. They cannot face the prospect
of a cheerless, colorless life of mis-
ery. So they go out into the Tier-
garten and shoot themselves, or, if
they haven't a revolver, hang them-
selves in their homes.

Particularly tragic are the sui-
cides of aged couples. Within one
week, in one small German city, six
couples committed suicide. Their
life savings gone as a result of the
furious rise in prices, and unable to
work, they could see no way out ex-
cept suicide. And the suicide rate
among the aged is high here in Ber-
lin.
