THE COLONIZATION PLAN

With the Grants Pass Irrigation district selected as the first project in the state to come under the colonization and settlement work of the state Chamber of Commerce, an influx of settlers may be expected within the next few months.

The district now has a chance of being settled quickly. The larger tracts can be broken up and sold to smaller acreages to the newcomer who will immediately put it into cultivation.

The local district will receive favorable advertising, for W. G. Ide, head of the colonization in the state, was highly complimentary. He found the climate and soil unexcelled and said that he would even consider making his home within the district.

The speculator will find no help from the state organization. Land must be sold at a price fixed by their true value. The settler will not be told to buy at a price higher than the land is worth.

The people of the city are joining the Chamber of Commerce in large numbers. The chamber is interested in making Grants Pass a better place in which to live and the people see

Kansas City, Mo., Feb. 21.—(I. N. S.)—Staid financiers of this Mid-Western city were somewhat astonished recently when they learned that a debutante had invaded their ranks in the role of a bank director. Stockholders of a suburban bank awarded Miss Frances Fleming—a pulchritudinous member of the country club "set"—the honor of being the first representative of the fair sex to grace the directorate of a bank in the "show-me" state.

Week after week local ministers scathingly denounce the law enforcement agencies of this city, who they declare, are making no attempt to enforce the prohibition law. "The crippled person nearly always proves to be of invaluable aid to his employer," Bigler said. "He realizes he must use his head to supply the deficiencies of his body. Therefore he is a success, because he thinks."
