CHINESE MEDICINE MAN BUYS HIS BEAR FEET

Trapper Finds a Ready Market in San Francisco for the Fruits of His Hunt.

Joseph Jaegal, a trapper living in Stillwater, Cal., has found a new article of export. He recently killed a big black bear a short distance from his home. Bear meat is not much account but the feet of the bear are marketable in San Francisco for medicinal purposes. Jaegal shipped the four big feet of the bear he killed to a Chinese medicine manufacturer in San Francisco and received \$2.50 for them. Bears were never more plentiful in his part of the state than they have been this season.

In Siskiyou county, Pedro Cortano reports that he knows of seven having been slain in the immediate vicinity of his home near the Trinity county boundary. Three were killed by the Pitts brothers and four by James Gregg and his son. One of the bears slain by the Pitts brothers weighed 500 pounds. The mountains at the head of Salmon river abound in bears, brown and black.

Over in Trinity county near Hyampom, where William Yrett has a mountain ranch, he reported last month that the bears had ruined several of his fine trees by climbing after fruit. He killed five bears on his place. In Shasta county bears are more plentiful than ever in the big bend of the Pit.

Maltstones Break Watermelons.

Maltstones big enough to break watermelons wide open, with a full of 12 inches deep in some places caused considerable crop damage in the Piedmont section of North Carolina. The heaviest fall was in Iredell county around Concord, where it beat down growing crops, a thin coating of ice was reported after daylight.
