Spring Has Arrived—
Although people in the Rogue valley have been enjoying the spring weather for the past two months, the season did not officially arrive until today. The season is marked by a general rise in temperature in southern Oregon, although last night, there were indications of a freeze. The mercury dropped to 33 during the night. The fruit has reached such a stage that a freeze would kill the almonds, plums and many peaches which are now starting to bloom, especially in the Fruitdale section. None of the fruit has been hurt so far but a hard frost would cause much damage now. The pears are beginning to bud rapidly.

Notice to Orchardist—
And Fruit Tree Owners—Notice is hereby given that spraying for the control of San Jose scale and other pests must be done at once in compliance with the Oregon Horticultural law and that trees or shrubs found infested with this pest after April 1st, 1923, will be handled according to law which provides not only for the abatement of this nuisance, but also a fine in addition. Those unable to spray should avail themselves of commercial spray outfits now available. Information regarding spraying will be gladly given. H. B. Howell, Deputy Horticultural Commissioner.
