A strike has been proclaimed in
an order by the leaders of the Industrial
Workers of the World. The whole
lumbering industry would be paral-
yzed if the organization were able
to put their order in operation. In
some places the mills have been
closed with the prospects of starting
up again within a few days or as soon
as labor can be obtained.Oregon is confronted with a whole-
sale piece of red propaganda. The
good citizens of the state should take
definite steps to see that the strike
progresses no further than it is at
present. The I. W. W. element has
been known to indulge in sabotage to
gain its ends. The demands made by
them are enough to show that pat-riotism is not a part of their creed for
in demanding the release of the Cen-
tralia murderers they are asking
something to which no patriotic
American will yield. It is time that
America were rid of such elements.Evidently the sugar speculators
think something of the strength of
the American housewives when band-
ed together. The trading in sugar
futures was shot today when word
was given out that a strike on buying
is being inaugurated in the country.
If the movement only becomes suffi-
ciently wide-spread, the sugar price
may be brought within reason.

Mrs. Helen Mary Dotson

Mrs. Helen Mary Dotson was born
December 12, 1843, in Taylor county,
West Virginia. She died April 24,
1923 at the age of 80 years, 4 mo.
and 12 days. In 1872 she was
married to James G. Dotson and left
for Kansas on her wedding day, im-
mediately after the ceremony. She
lived in Kansas for 18 years with her
husband, moving to Oregon with him
in 1890, where she made her home
until her death. To this union were
born three children, two sons and a
daughter. Minnie Dotson died in
Kansas at the age of six. Early died
in Grants Pass in 1908 and Dorrance
E. died in Tacoma on December 16,
1922.She is survived by five sister and
