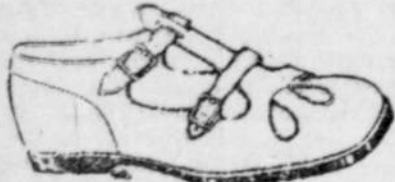
Pacific Coast States: Generally fair, with normal temperature.

THE COUNTY FAIR

At the present time the task of lining up amusements for the Josephine county fair this fall is occupying the attention of those in whose hands the holding of the fair has been placed. It is realized that to make the event the success that it deserves, there must be adequate amusements to draw a large crowd, not only from Grants Pass and Josephine county, but from neighboring communities. Several committees are now working on plans for the building of a race track at the fair grounds.

Since the first days of the county fair, horse racing has been recognized as one of the essentials. So far, the Josephine fair has been without horse racing or other adequate amusement. The meeting Saturday night has opened up possibilities in this line which may be of great value. The soil at the fair grounds is sandy and especially adaptable to racing as it drains easily. There are few places in Oregon where all year racing can be held and once the track is installed, the races can be held as often as desired. Several handlers of racing horses would come here, one already having a string in Grants Pass.

The providing of amusements for the fair should not stop with the horse racing for many people do not care for this form of entertainment. Different forms to appeal to different people are needed. In this line it should be strongly recommended that available concessions be lined up and the whole community brought into the work of making the fair a success. The Josephine county fair is our fair, to be what we make it.

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population

Winnemucca, Nev., May 7.—(I. N. S.)—Nevada's interest in the family life of King Tut, of the Valley of the Kings, shifted to the sand dunes of Winnemucca when workmen recently plowed up the skeleton of a great Indian chief of Nevada antiquity, buried with the relics of his ancient race.

Within the ancient burial ground, opened when a huge sand dune was being leveled, were stone tablets bearing strange hieroglyphics, rude implements of warfare, unfamiliar cooking utensils, many beautiful seashells such as would have been worn only by a chieftain of rank, and a greater array of flint spear and arrow heads that has ever been found since white settlements were established here.

Archaeological interest centers in the strange stone tablets, for time's devastating hand has effaced much which might have been preserved to a curious posterity had the ancient Nevada tribes used the same care of the dead as is found in the preservation of the Egyptian Pharaohs.

Ethnologists who have studied the picture writings on the rock walls of Nevada mountains placed centuries ago by unknown races, have discovered a striking similarity with certain rock writings of Asia.

The scholar Von Humboldt, after long studies in Nevada and the West, said: "It appears most evident to me that the monuments, methods of computing time, systems and cosmogony, and the many myths of America, offer striking analogies with the ideas of Western Asia—ideas which indicate an ancient communication and are not simply the result of that uniform condition in which all nations are found in that gray dawn of civilization."

Discoveries made in this region may or may not give affirmation to the Humboldtian hypothesis, yet the lure of the unknown is in the blood of the rancher who uncovered the bones of the chieftain, and further excavations of the dunes are to be started immediately.

Professor J. C. Jones, archaeologist, and Professor B. E. Schappell, ethnologist, both of the University of Nevada, intend to investigate the discovery.
