## Here's Something New in Damage Suits

ONLY \$1,000!

KANSAS CITY, MO.—Here's something new in damage suits against a railroad. Mrs. Lorene Caldwell sued the Chicago & Alton in a federal court for \$50,000 damages, caused when one of its switch engines struck her motorcar. She suffered no broken bones, no disfiguring cuts or bruises, no shock causing nervous prostration. What resulted was far worse than any injury of that sort. Something happened, it is alleged, to her endocrine gland, which information is a trifle vague for the average reader, but possibly refers to the mysterious little pineal gland near the base of the brain.

At all events, after the collision with the switch engine two years ago, the plaintiff began to gain rapidly in weight and the doctors decided that
