EXTEND THE FIRE LIMITS

Considerable agitation has been
started recently, looking toward the
extension of the city fire limits. At
the present time the fire limits in-
clude only that part of the city as
far as K street to the south, allow-
ing the unrestricted building of
frame structures along lower Sixth.
The frame buildings are desirable
now, but in a few years they may be-
come a fire menace and prevent the
building of more substantial busi-
ness blocks near them. The diffi-
culties attendant upon the tearing
down of the worn out frame build-
ings has been seen in the past few
years here.It is suggested that the limits be
extended as far as M street. This
will take care of all of the building
that will be done in the next few
years. The growth of the city is so
rapid at the present time that it will
be a matter of but three or four
years before the block between L and
M streets will be in demand for busi-
ness locations. The trend of build-
ing appears to be in that direction as
the greater number of farmers come
n from that part of the city.Several frame buildings are now
under construction along that part

of Sixth street which would be in-
cluded in the extended fire limits.
While the business represented by
these new enterprises is wanted and
nothing would be done to hinder
them, it is felt that more substan-
tial structures should be required in
the future.Nothing can be done after a build-
ing is once erected to condemn it as
long as it is safe and as long as it
is bringing income to its owner. For
this reason some regulation should
be had in the supervision of the
building operations. The only way
that it will be possible to do this will
be to make an extension to the fire
limits. This will in no way effect
those buildings now under construc-
tion or already constructed but will
give the city officials some authority
in deciding what type of structures
may be made.Lieut. Alys G. Grindle, who has
been in charge of the local branch
of the Salvation Army for the past
twelve months, has just been notified

Tau Omega fraternity.WAR VETERAN HELPS
IN NARCOTIC FIGHTDuluth, Minn., June 5.—(I. N. S.)
—Information supplied by a World
War veteran now confined in a hos-
pital here may lead to the breaking
up of a narcotic ring, with headquar-
ters here, whose operations
reached every city of size in the
Northwest and as far East as Pitts-
burgh. Two members of the al-
leged ring—a man and a woman—
are now in jail here charged with
narcotic law violation.The former soldier, whose identity
was not revealed by the Federal
agents, is said to have admitted for-
mer association with Dennis Baker,
the man held for alleged illicit sale
of narcotics, and Louis Becker, Su-
perior (Wis.) man, now serving time
at Fort Leavenworth for violation of
the narcotics regulations. He is said
to have furnished Federal authorities
with information revealing the oper-
ations of one of the most highly or-
ganized drug smuggling rings yet un-
covered in this region.Baker, Federal agents charge,
furnished their investigators with
narcotics. Letters were mailed to
him, it is charged, at his headquar-
ters requesting that he send \$5
worth of "Mabel" and the same
amount of "Clarence"—underworld
"code" for morphine and cocaine, re-
spectively. The drugs were sent to
them at Minneapolis, the agents
charge. They were paid for with
marked bills.When Baker was arrested in his
shanty home, near the Canadian bor-
der, no drugs were found on his per-
son or premises. A number of letters,
in which reference was made to ship-
ments of "Mabel," "Mary," "Mud"
and "Horses," were found. Drug
smugglers, the agents explain, use
words beginning with the letter "M"

in a ramshackle bureau jammed
full of banknotes.The arrest, at St. Paul, of a wo-
man who gave her name as Mrs.
Pearl Woods, also is expected to
prove an important factor in ferret-
ing out the other members of the al-
leged ring. This woman was said
to have had a considerable quantity
of "dope" in her possession when ar-
rested. She is alleged to have acted
as a "business agent" for the alleged
ring.The smugglers, it is believed by
Federal investigators, operated
across the international border at
International Falls. Drugs are al-
leged to have been smuggled in by
them across the border at that point
in vast quantities. It is also be-
lieved that the ring has made use of
Lake Superior and Rainy Lake. Small
motor boats are used extensively,
the agents claim, by the drug runners
who operate on the lakes.Operations of the ring are said to
have reached Chicago, the Twin
Cities, Milwaukee, Kansas City and

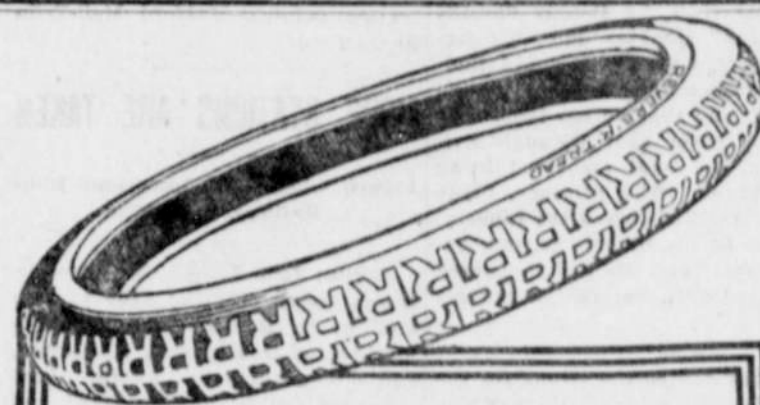
