THE ROGUE AND CHICKENS

The success of M. J. Foster, of
New Hope, in securing the second
prize in the gross income section of
the national poultry contest con-
ducted by Successful Farming, brings en-
couragement to those interested in
the business in Grants Pass. Mr.
Foster was competing with poultry
growers from all sections of the
country and his success proves be-
yond any doubt that the Rogue val-
ley is excellently adapted to the en-
terprise.

The figures submitted by Mr. Fos-
ter are conclusive for he has kept
a careful record for several years
past. He started with but 63 hens
and 5 cockerels and in the year,
built up his flock to 216 hens and 13
cockerels. His total gross income
was \$1146.02 for the flock, of which
amount \$603.96 was expense. His
net income for the year on the pen
was \$542.06 or over \$2 per hen, pro-
fit on the number carried to the end
of the season.

Now if Mr. Foster can succeed so
well with a small pen, there is no
reason to believe that success would
not attend a venture on a larger
scale. The climate is ideal for poul-
try raising and the well drained river
bottom soil will not hold diseases
which inflict large losses in other
sections of the state. The only
thing that can possibly hold back the
poultry industry is the fact that
freight rates are high. That diffi-
culty however, is one that can be
adjusted.

him.

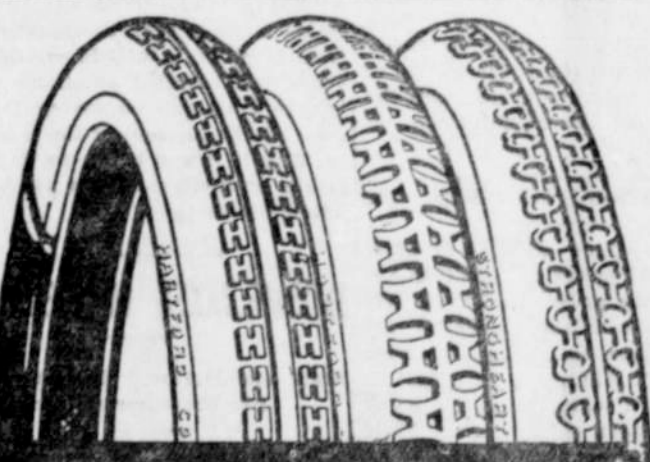
