VAGRANT YELLOW RIVER TO
BE PUT BACK IN ITS COURSE

Peking, June 7.—(A. P.)—The
Yellow river, China's most treacher-
ous waterway, which caused incal-
culable damage when it broke its
banks two years ago and made a new
channel, is to be returned to its origi-
nal course. Fourteen thousand la-
borers are engaged in the building
of dykes, and it is expected soon to
increase the number to 20,000.

W. H. Mallory, executive secretary
of the China International Famine
Relief commission, estimated the
cost of corralling the Yellow River
at \$1,500,000 Chinese currency, of
which sum the finance commission
of the government relief bureau has
provided \$360,000.
