HOLDING BIG REUNION

New York, June 7.—(I. N. S.)—

The generals and colonels and lesser
officers, the top kickers and mere
buck privates, who, as members of
the Second Division, halted the Ger-
man rush to Paris, in 1918, and
and fought the best of the Teuton di-
visions to a standstill at Chateau
Thierry, at St. Mihiel, at Soissons
and in the Argonne, met here today
for the fifth annual reunion and frolic
of the Second Division Association.
All rank and distinction were forgot-
ten as the twenty-five hundred men,
from virtually every state in the uni-
on, assembled to renew old acquaint-
ance and recount the old feats of the
division. The crabbings, the jawing,
the kidding of the days of the divi-
sion in France were renewed as small
groups gathered to tell of the rush
in Champagne or the historic battle
at Belleau Wood, where the Marines
of the division showed the true worth
of the American fighting forces. It
was the stand of the Americans at
Belleau Wood which caused the
French General Degoutte to issue a
general order in June, 1918, de-
claring that Belleau Wood should
thereafter be called the "Bols de la
Brigade de Marine."

Two of the three division com-
manders were present—Major-Gen-
eral John A. Lejeune, who led the
division from July, 1918, to the final
day of the war, and Major-General
James G. Harbord, who commanded
the troop in the Soissons. Major-
General Omar Bundy, who led the
division in the early stages of the war,
could not attend, as he is stationed
in the Philippines.

General John J. Pershing, Secre-
tary of War Weeks, Secretary of the
Navy, Denby, Assistant Secretary
Theodore Roosevelt, Admiral Plunk-
ett and other officials are expected to
be present during the three days the
reunion will be in progress.

One of the more prominent of the
division's heroes—First Sergeant
Dan Daly, attached to a machine gun
company and holder of practically
every decoration this Government be-
stows, as well as foreign decorations
—was the centre of a group of grin-
ing admirers, who insisted on Daly
telling of his numerous heroisms.

While a spirit of gaiety pervaded
the meeting a somber touch was given
by the presence of a group of dis-
abled members of the division and a
number of gold-star mothers. The
fame of the Second Division as the
flower of the American forces in
France was bought with 24,249 casu-
alties—dead, wounded, missing and
prisoners—the greatest number of
casualties suffered by any American
division. For the thousands of dead
in France a special prayer and a eu-
logy were offered this afternoon by
the Reverend Jason Noble Pierce, of
Washington, senior chaplain of the
division.

Curios on Display—

Several display windows of the
city are devoted to articles of war-
fare, used during the Civil war pe-
riod, bringing back memories to the
men who had used them, and excit-
ing curiosity among those of the
younger generation. The Bonbon-
niere is showing a very interesting
collection of these articles, which in-
clude old army guns, revolvers,
swords, powder horns, and other war
impedimenta.

Much Mail Is "Dead"—

Information has been received
from the postoffice department, that
a large amount of mail is being sent
to the dead letter office, principally
because of insufficient address. All
mail should have the full and com-
plete address, including the street
number when possible, states Post-
master Quinlan. In case the street
address is not known, the occupation
of the addressee should be shown,
such as clerk in store, miner, ma-
chinist, housemaid, as the case may
be and this will aid materially in the
delivery of the mail. The name and
address of the sender should be
shown in the upper left hand corner,
and this will insure return to the
sender in case delivery to the addres-
see is impossible and prevent your
mail from being sent to the dead let-
ter office.

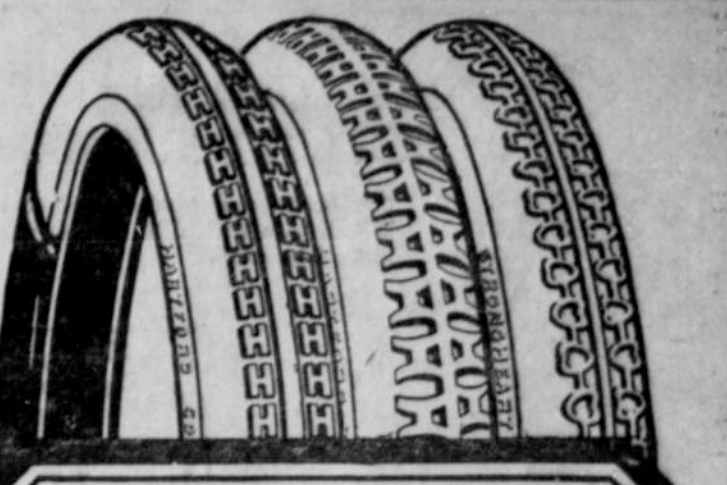
