UNION MEMORIAL IS SOUGHT

Students at Agricultural College Start Huge Campaign

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, June 8.—(Special)—The union memorial building campaign for from \$300,000 to \$500,000, started by the students themselves and backed by the alumni last Saturday, was enthusiastically approved by the board of regents in regular session. That the structure be fire-proof and up-to-date in every detail is the intention of the board. Similar buildings in other institutions will be studied before final plans are completed. The building will be designed to meet future requirements. The site, it was agreed tentatively, is to be north and east of the new commerce building.

Placing the non-resident tuition fees at \$50 a term or \$150 for the school year was an act by the board of regents. This makes the fee the same as that charged Oregon students, who attend institutions in Washington and California. Sentiments among the state legislators at the recent session favored such action on the part of the boards of regents of the college and the state university. It was considered only fair that students coming to Oregon from other states should pay the same fee required of Oregon students. Year before last a non-resident fee was placed at \$60 and last year was increased to \$105 for the school year.
