WOMAN FALLS FROM WINDOW TO HER DEATH

PORTLAND MAN HELD UNTIL INVESTIGATION CAN BE MADE

STRUGGLE IN ROOM INDICATED

Occupant of Room Directly Above Spot Where Woman Struck Says He Knows Nothing

Portland, June 13.—(A. P.)—Injured by falling from a window in a downtown rooming house early today, Beale Reed died later at a hospital. The police took into custody William N. Owens, 52, a logger, whom they found in a room directly above the spot where the woman struck the sidewalk. They said the room was disarranged, indicating a struggle. Owens declared he did not know how the woman fell. An autopsy will be made later today.

TWELVE IN MEDFORD RACES

Medford To Be Mecca of Fans of Race Track Friday

Medford, June 13.—(Special)—Twelve cars will take off from the starting point in the big free-for-all which is the main event of the racing meet starting Friday at Medford. A recent casualty in tryouts has resulted in the elimination of the Monroe Special owned by George Holmes of Eagle Point. Bill Offutt's Rabbit stripped all its tires in attempting to turn too quickly and Noel Colby's National had a collision on the streets of Grants Pass, but neither accident is expected to keep the cars out of the running.

NORTHWESTERN'S WAR HEROES ARE HONORED

Chicago, June 13.—(I. N. S.)—An avenue of elms on the campus of Northwestern University, at Evanston, has been dedicated in honor of the Northwestern students who fell on the field of battle in the World War. Their names were inscribed on a bronze tablet secured to a rough boulder at the south end of the avenue. Included among the seventy-four names are the names of seven men who were killed in the Civil War.

GREAT BRITAIN IS WORRIED OVER EMIGRATION OF SKILLED WORKERS AND DOMESTICS TO U. S.

London, June 13.—(A. P.)—Great Britain is worried over the increasing number of skilled artisans and domestic servants who want to take up their abodes in the United States. The stream of emigrants which has flocked from these shores to America has caused a special committee of the government to inquire into the causes.

Only the exhaustion of the annual quota of British subjects eligible to enter the United States under the percentage law has prevented tens of thousands of others from pitching their tents under the Stars and Stripes. HISTORIC ELMS HOTEL TO CLOSE ITS PORTALS

Sturbridge, Mass., June 13.—(I. N. S.)—Historic old Elms hotel has closed its doors after 152 years of continuous public service. During the hotel's long period of service many distinguished persons have stopped there, including Lafayette, the famous Frenchman.

The giant elm trees from which the hotel received its name, and which stand in front of the old building, were planted about 1840 by the late Governor Samuel C. Crafts, then 10 years old. The present owner, John S. Hubbard, plans to make the hotel his home.

OLD "PURITAN" IS TO BE BURNED FOR HER METALS

Woodmont, Conn., June 13.—(I. N. S.)—A site has been prepared on the shore here for the funeral pyre of the steamer "Puritan," which in the palmy days of the Charles S. Meilen regime was "Queen of Long Island Sound," and here the stripped hull will go up in flames so that wreckers may get at her metals more easily.

To get her 5,000 tons of metal will cost \$25,000, say contractors who were awarded the job at New Haven. But even then New Haven road officials believe they will be justified in their refusal of an offer of \$500,000 cash for the boat as she stood some years ago.

Fined for Speeding

When Fred Gordon, operator of a stage line through the three coast states, got a little too much speed on his car last Sunday he let himself in for a lot of grief. He was picked up by Officer J. J. McMahon and was taken into court on Monday. He entered a plea of guilty which was later withdrawn. He again changed his plea of guilty, however, and drew a fine of \$50 and a jail sentence of five days. He is now serving out his time in the county bastille.

OREGON CAVES WILL BE FILMED

Cavemen Will Have Moving Pictures Taken In Caverns

The Caves are due for more publicity, through the activities of the local organization of the Cavemen. The Educational Film company has notified the Cavemen that moving pictures will be taken at the Caves next Sunday and all of the members have been told to be on hand with their skins so that they can appear in the pictures. Captain M. McKenzie, production manager for the company, was in the city making arrangements for the filming.

It is planned to depict the Cavemen in their natural haunts. It is probable that the pictures will be taken both inside and outside of the caverns and this will provide much advertising for the resort as the pictures will be shown over the whole country. The Educational Film company is located at San Anselmo, Cal.

TERROR REIGN IS STARTED IN RUHR DISTRICT

GUERRILLA WARFARE IS OPENED AS REPRISAL FOR DEATH OF GERMAN

FRENCH SLATED FOR DEATH

High Army Officers To Be Assassinated State Reports—German Engineer To Be Executed

Duesseldorf, June 13.—(A. P.)—An organized reign of terror in the form of Guerilla warfare is being carried on against the occupying forces in the Ruhr valley, according to French military headquarters, which considers that this campaign of revenge is directed by the Nationalists for the execution of ex-German Officer Albert Schlager, for sabotage. General Degoutte and other high army officers are slated for assassination, the military secret service reports declare.

Mayence, June 13.—(A. P.)—The death penalty has been imposed by a French courtmartial upon the German engineer, George, of the Baden Aniline and Soda works at Ludwigshafen, who is charged with sabotage. The French authorities say that he confessed.

MILLIONS SPENT ON RAILWAY

Sweden Asks Large Sum for Electrification of Railroad

Stockholm, June 13.—(A. P.)—The first coast to coast railroad electrification in the world, extending from Stockholm on the Baltic sea, to Gothenburg, on the North Sea, is heralded in the official request just made to the Swedish government by the state railway administration that it be empowered to begin immediately the expenditure of the 23,000,000 crowns which have already been appropriated toward this project.

This is an important step in the great movement which has already resulted in the electrification of hundreds of leading industrial establishments, and at least 50 per cent of all the farming area in Sweden.

The trunk line from Stockholm to Gothenburg, which carries heavy traffic both of freight and passengers, is nearly 300 miles in length. The work of electrification can be carried through within two years, says the Railway Administration, and if it is begun immediately the total cost will be about 47,000,000 crowns, or about \$12,600,000.

ANTIENS DID NOT HAVE TO PULL OUT WHISKERS

London, June 13.—(I. N. S.)—Shaving in the days before Christ was not such a painful operation as some modern day people would think, if some remarkable antique finds, including a wonderfully preserved razor blade found near the old Roman Camp at Ham Hill, near Yeovil, England, bear out the experts' claims as to their origin and antiquity. The blade, which is of iron, is mounted in modern fashion, with the joint-pole pin between blade and tang, on a bone handle, carved with a dot and circle ornamentation, and is certainly of great age.

GRANTS PASS FAN WINS RADIO DISTANCE PRIZE

Pullman, Wash., June 13.—A. N. Ward, of Grants Pass, Ore., won the prize offered by radio broadcasting station KPAE the other night for the first fan 500 miles or more from the State College of Washington to report hearing the program broadcast. Mr. Ward is a Washington "native son," who says: "It is a pleasure to report KPAE, whose broadcast came in clearly tonight, but was difficult to select on my simplified Flewellyn circuit. Several stations are very close to you at this point. My boy is receiving the talk on automobile ignition while this letter is being written. We hope still more of the educational programs will be broadcast at night, when reception is wider. A great field is open. Thank you for your lectures." A previous prize offered was won by Elton Northcott of Waideck, Sas.

SAYS HAWAII IS IDEAL TO CURE WHITE PLAGUE

Honolulu, June 13.—(I. N. S.)—The climate of Hawaii is ideal for the treatment of tuberculosis, according to Dr. R. Nelson Hatt, orthopedic surgeon, who is in charge of a special clinic for the treatment of children's diseases here, organized by local Shriners in co-operation with the national body.

"It is my impression that the Hawaiian climate offers almost Utopian conditions for the relief of tuberculosis," Dr. Hatt said in an address before the annual meeting of the Medical Society of Hawaii.

THREE KILLED WHEN FREIGHT HITS MACHINE

ACCIDENT NEAR HOQUIAM THIS MORNING PROVES FATAL TO AUTOISTS

TWO ARE SERIOUSLY INJURED

Driver and Two Others Able To Go On To City—Were Returning From Seattle Bouts

Tacoma, June 13.—(A. P.)—Auburn Hall and Peter Jensen, both Hoquiam men, were killed and three men were seriously injured when a Milwaukee freight train crashed into the automobile in which eight Hoquiam fight fans were returning from Seattle where they had witnessed a bout. The accident occurred at Sumner early this morning.

Edward Ramstead, 24, died later at the hospital, bringing the death list in the Sumner automobile accident to three. The two in the hospital, Joe Sonenbend and Clifford Hansen, are in a critical condition. Frank W. Cole, the driver, John Gowen and Loran Gage were injured but were able to proceed to Hoquiam.

BRITAIN APPEASED BY SOVIET

Last Russian Note Given Consideration by Government

London, June 13.—British government, replying to the last Russian note, states that the Soviet Government, having complied with the essential British demands, "This correspondence may now be brought to a conclusion." Great Britain undertakes not to assist any hostile designs against the Soviet Government or the republics associated with it.

BULGARIA IN GRIP OF STRIFE

Civil War is Reported Throughout Whole Nation

Belgrade, June 12.—Dispatches report that civil war is in progress throughout the greater part of Bulgaria. Former cabinet ministers Obboff and Doupnaroff are reported to have been killed in an engagement with revolutionary troops.

SERBIAN DIPLOMAT IS FLEEING

Stamboulisky, accompanied by a Friend on Horseback

Sofia, June 13.—Former Premier Stamboulisky, accompanied by a single friend, is reported fleeing on horseback through the mountains in the direction of Pirdop, pursued by revolutionary horsemen.

STOCK BROKER GUILTY OF BUCKETING CHARGES

New York, June 13.—(A. P.)—Edward M. Fuller and W. Frank McGee, stock brokers, today pleaded guilty to a bucketing charge. They were remanded for sentence on Friday.

MILK RECORD CLAIMED FOR LARAMIE HOLSTEIN

Laramie, Wyo., June 13.—(I. N. S.)—The experiment station stock farm of the University of Wyoming is claiming the State record for "Ester," a Holstein 4-year-old cow, the cow being credited with twenty pounds of butter fat for one week and 350 pounds as a two-year-old. She has had three calves, the last being twins, both of which are doing well from the excess of milk the cow gives.

The station has a Tamworth sow, with a litter of eleven pigs, having weaned a litter of twelve some weeks before farrowing the eleven.

ENGLAND BUILDS LARGE SUB

All Lessons and Experiences Gained in War Are Embodied

London, June 13.—(I. N. S.)—What is claimed to be the most remarkable submarine built by any power since the war, and embodying all the lessons and experiences gained from a study of captured German submarines, is nearing completion in Chatham Dockyard, England.

When completed she is expected to be the biggest and fastest submarine in commission, having a displacement when submerged of over 3,500 tons, equal to the displacement of the best light cruisers, and a speed of 15 to 20 knots when on the surface, with half that speed when submerged.

Official details are being withheld, but it is understood that she will carry a twelve-inch gun, which, elevated to a high angle, is fired when the vessel is twelve to twenty feet under water.

She is stated to be far in advance of anything the Germans designed, and even surpasses the wonders of the M. Type of British submarine, which for some time were the marvel of the naval men.

Though nothing has yet leaked out as to her range of action, it is understood to be very great, while numerous experiments hitherto unheard of have been made as to living quarters and vulnerability.

RAW SUGAR MARKET SLUMP

Traders Become Demoralized Over Demand for Refined

New York, June 12.—Disappointed over demand for refined sugar, traders in the market for raw sugar became demoralized today and sold heavily, breaking the prices 60 to 67 points. Rallies of 25 to 30 followed on covering, but the undertone after midday was still unsettled.

CHINESE PRESIDENT ABDICATE

Li Yuan Hung Vacates Office When Hostile Army Gathers

Peking, June 13.—President Li Yuan Hung, with a hostile army of his countrymen at the capital's gates ready to enter if he refused to vacate his office, yielded to the pressure of the militarists today and left for Tien Tsin in a special train.

DEVELOPMENT OF CHRISTIAN MISSION OVER WORLD BRINGS MINISTRATION TO 42,000,000

Chicago, June 13.—(A. P.)—The

development of a Christian mission enterprise through an "inter-denominational and un-denominational organization" over a period of thirty-six years, is the history of the Christian and Missionary alliance, as recorded here in the 26th annual council just closed.

The work began in 1887, and today the organization claims active ministration to 42,000,000 souls in every quarter of the globe. It is one of the largest of the new organizations working in the foreign fields whose program is founded upon a belief in the literal inspiration of the scriptures. The Whole Bible to the Whole World is the motto of the alliance.

CAVEMEN GIVE GOOD CONCERT AT PORTLAND

ROSE CITY WAS REACHED LAST NIGHT AT 5:45 BY THE LOCAL CARAVAN

MANY INQUIRIES RECEIVED

Radio Broadcast Brings Messages as to How To Reach Caves And Also About Grants Pass

Portland, Ore., June 13.—(Special to Courier)—The Cavemen caravan arrived in Portland at 5:45 o'clock Tuesday and took the Imperial Hotel their headquarters, by storm. They broadcast from the Oregonian later. The program was a huge success. Many telephoned their compliments and the Oregonian began receiving numerous town and out-of-town inquiries relative to the Oregon Caves, as to how to reach them and about accommodations and also about Grants Pass.

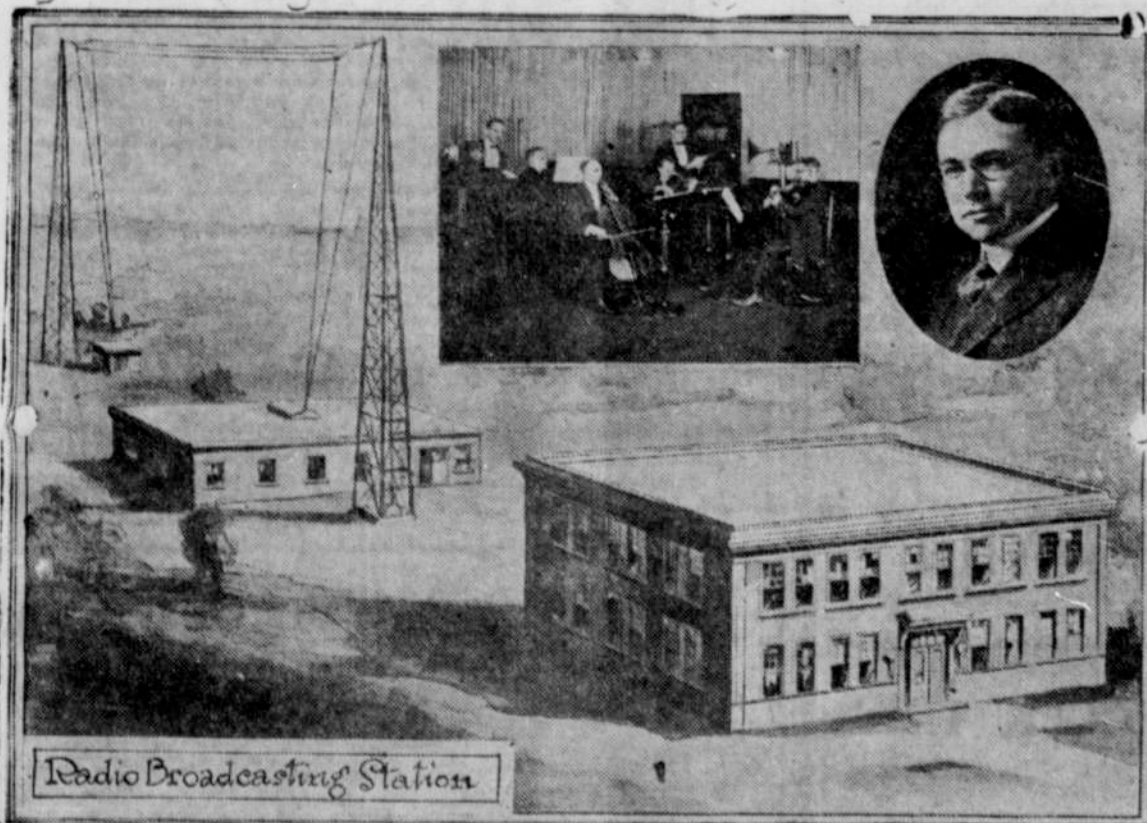
The Cavemen reached Portland last night at 5:45 p. m. without any serious trouble. They got to the Rose City in time to give their radio concert which was heard by local fans. They reached Salem at 3:30 and paid a brief call at the state house. Traffic department officers were said to be doing great service on the trip. Comments from the Eugene and Roseburg papers are printed.

The Roseburg News Review said: "A caravan of Cavemen on the way from Grants Pass to Portland, spent a short time in Roseburg, this morning. The Cavemen are on their way to attend the Rose Festival where they expect to let everyone present know that the Oregon Caves have the liveliest bunch of boosters in the state working for them. The Cavemen stopped at the Wolf Creek Tavern for breakfast, where a special meal was prepared and donated. The proprietor dressed as a waitress served them and none of his friends recognized him in his flapper garb until he made himself known."

"The caravan reached Roseburg shortly after 8 o'clock and remained for only a short time. There are 15 cars carrying about 40 of the Cavemen to Portland."

The Eugene Guard had the following: "To impress upon the world the desirability of seeing the Oregon Caves in Josephine county, on a side trip motor route out of Grants Pass, a group of about 75 boosters known as the 'Cavemen' were here today enroute to the Portland rose festival. Perhaps on account of the cooling showers, none of the company exhibited themselves in their prehistoric costumes by parading through the city streets. It is reported however that something of that nature may be looked for from these enthusiastic boosters for the home beauty spots on their return through town. While here, they made headquarters at the Osburn."
