SCHOOL ELECTION

To the electors of School District No. 7, of Josephine County, Oregon: The annual election of directors of School District No. 7 of Josephine County, Oregon, will be held at the Washington school on C street, between Third and Fourth streets on Monday, June 18, 1923. At ten o'clock on the morning of the said day at the said Washington school will be held at meeting of electors at which time the budget for the year 1923-24 as recommended by the budget committee composed of O. S. Blanchard, Frank Washburn, James P. Doyle, Jennie J. Moss and T. P. Cramer, will be considered and discussed. In the afternoon of the said day the polls will be open at two o'clock and remain open until 7 o'clock. Two ballots will be submitted to the electors. (1) For the election of two directors for a term of three years each. The vacancies to be filled by elections are those arising through the expiration of the terms of W. D. Fry and Minnie L. Tufts. (2) (a) Whether S. D. No. 7, shall levy a special tax for the year 1923-24 which exceeds by more than 6 per cent the special tax levied by said district for the preceding year, and (b) whether the said district shall levy a special tax of \$52,036.65, the same being the amount of the special tax referred to in subdivision (a). All citizens of the state of Oregon who are twenty-one years of age and who have resided in the district for a period of thirty days or more are qualified to vote for director, but in order to be qualified to vote on the question of the levying of the special tax, in addition to the foregoing qualifications one must own property within the district upon which he pays a tax and his name must appear upon the tax roll for the year preceding the said election. In other words in order to be a qualified voter on the question of levying the special tax the name of the voter must appear upon the 1922 assessment roll. Although one's name may not appear individually upon the tax roll if he is a stock holder in a corporation or joint stock company the name of which company appears upon the tax roll and he can present his stock certificates to the election board he is still a qualified voter for the special tax. Nominating petitions for director have been filed by the following persons: James Martin, Minnie L. Tufts, Ellen Thrasher and A. M. Heston. Respectfully submitted, EDWARD S. VAN DYKE, Clerk S. D. 

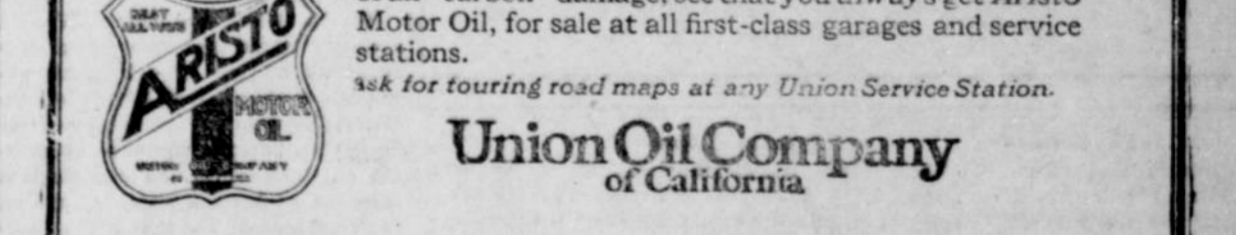
