Service Wins

Service can claim part of the credit for the victory of the Amer-
ican cars over the foreign entries in the recent great automobile rac-
ing classic at Indianapolis Speedway, Decoration Day, claims H. S.
Dishrow, local Willard dealer.

"Willard service was on hand to see that the Willard storage bat-

equipment," Mr. Dishrow said.

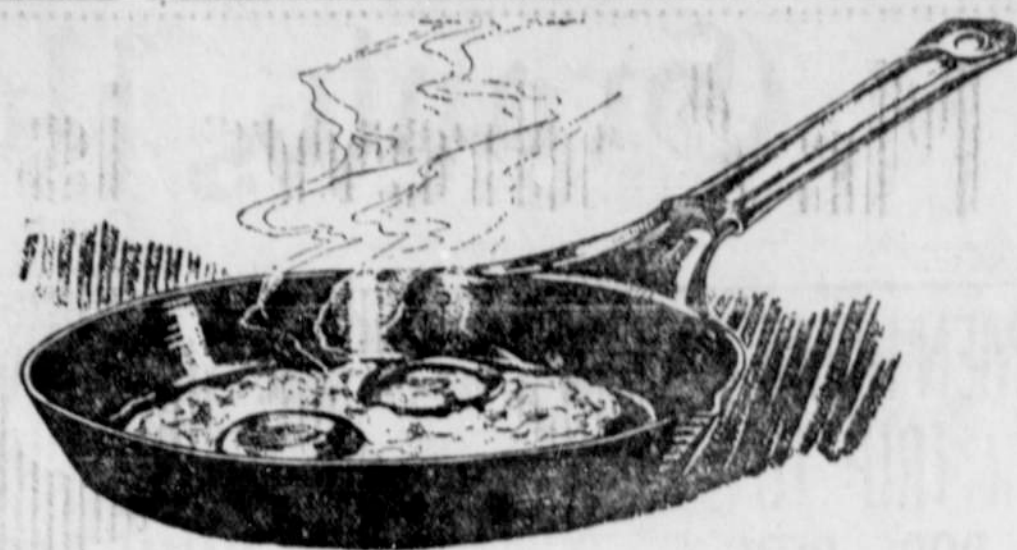
Tommy Milton's H. C. S. special, the winner, was equipped with
