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RACE TRACK MAY BE SECURED

Proposition Gets Serious Consideration at Meeting

Grants Pass may yet have a race track in time for the county fair this fall. At the meeting Monday night of the committee appointed to look into the matter, it was announced that the track and grandstand, with the necessary fences and stables could be secured for less than \$5000. It was decided that the committee start a subscription list and attempt to sign up sufficient funds for the enterprise.

The track can be made for \$700, it was stated. The grandstand would have a capacity of some 1500. The total amount also includes the stables for the horses and a double fence around the track. There was a large representation at the meeting and the sentiment appeared to be that such a sport as horse racing is absolutely necessary to make the fair a success.

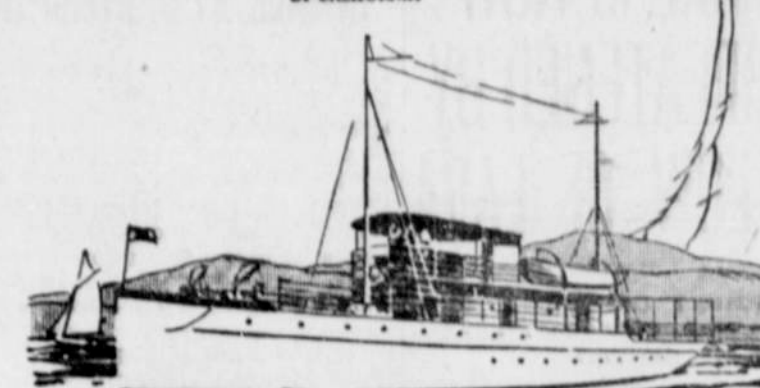
