THE SEWER SYSTEM

Grants Pass needs a new sewer
system. That is the verdict of the
city council, the city engineer and
others cognizant with the present
situation. The system now in use
was constructed some 20 years ago
while Grants Pass was extremely
small. It was ample to care for the
city during that time but Grants
Pass is now about twice as large and
is still growing. A new trunk line
system would be authorized. It
should be one that will care for the
needs of the city for many years to
come.

The street department is spend-
ing the greater part of the time
working on clogged sewers and no
end of trouble is experienced. The
outlay of \$27,000 would do away
with the necessity of bothering with
the sewers as is now required. Not
only would Grants Pass have a sys-
tem good for the present but there
would be ample provision for the ex-
pected growth. A bond election
must be called to authorize the con-
struction but there should be few
dissenting votes.

When the new sewer is construct-
ed one point should be emphasized.
The outlet should be at least a quar-
ter mile below the steel bridge on
Sixth street. The present outlets to
the sewers present anything but a
pleasing appearance to the people of
the city and to visitors. With a
small expenditure, the sewage could
be dumped into the river below
town.

UP TO THE CITY

The matter of the construction of
a race track at the fair grounds is
to be placed before the people of the
county soon. Manager Ireland, of
the county fair, states that the fair
board committee has decided to
make a canvass for subscriptions to
build the track and grandstand.
Every person in the city will be ap-
proached and it is emphasized by
those in charge that it now hangs
upon the response given by the peo-
ple here.

The fair does need some sport
such as racing to make it a success.
Last year the event was not a suc-
cess, either from the point of view
of entertainment or finances. There
were plenty of exhibits but that
would take a person to the grounds

Cattle Disease Reported

Editor Courier:
Having been asked by some of the
owners of livestock to let the public
know that we have had a few cases
of hemorrhagic septicemia amongst
our cattle and hogs in Josephine
county lately that they may be better
prepared to guard against this
disease, I will mention a few symp-
toms by which you may recognize it.

This disease is generally ushered
in with a chill, but as that is of short
duration it is not always noticed.
One common symptom in hogs is
diarrhea, a stiff, weak gait, arched
back, and while their appetite is im-
paired, they will eat some. In that
respect it differs from cholera.

In cattle, constipation is often
present in the early stages, terminat-
ing in diarrhea later and feces are
often streaked with blood. Cattle
also show a stiff gait, drooping ears,
unwillingness to move, and a gen-
eral haggard appearance.

Curative treatment is not of much
value after an animal is infected,
but this disease can be prevented
fairly well by vaccination.

While this disease is of an infec-
tious nature, and generally proves
fatal to a large number of animals
after getting into a herd, it does not
spread like many of our contagious

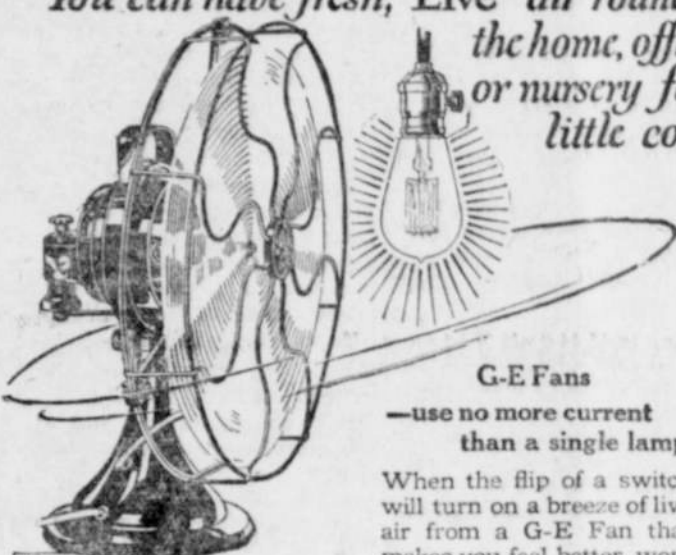

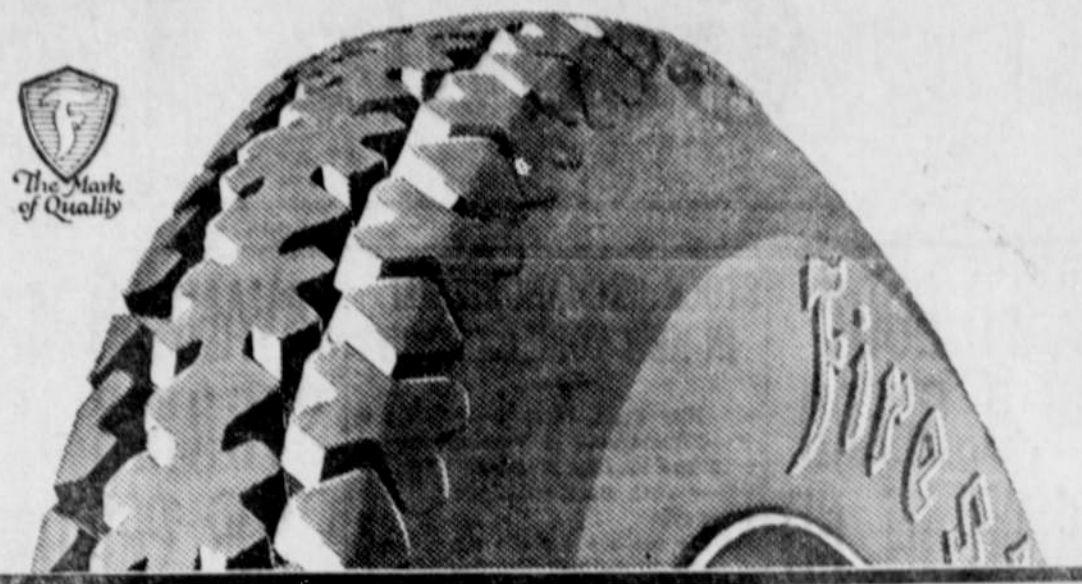
