PARKING CHANGE NEEDED

tem for automobiles in Grants Pass
Some change in the parking sys-
tem might not be amiss. Many sug-
gestions looking to such a change have
been heard recently and with the
increasing number of accidents, at-
tention is being directed more for-
cibly to a new system. Only this
morning a man cranked his car in
reverse and bumped over the curb
into a light post before he could
stop. Many merchants have had
plate glass windows broken from the
same cause. It is only a question of
time until one of these cars hits a
person and kills him. Such an ac-
cident was narrowly missed several
weeks ago when the car backed over
the curb near the Tourist grocery
and hit a passerby.

In most of the towns of Oregon
and of the other coast states the
system where the car heads into the
curb is used. Grants Pass and Salem
are about the only towns which still
cling to the other styles. Parking
should be standardized so that a
person visiting another town will be
familiar with the methods of going
into the curb. Where a person has
been in the habit of heading into
the curb, it is found difficult to back
in.

The head in system would also do
away with the confusion now result-
ing from turning between intersec-
tions. The officers are kept busy in-
forming people that they must turn
only at intersections. If they head-
ed in to the curb there would be less
incentive to turn around in the mid-
dle of the block.

Grants Pass should conform to
methods in use in other places. Some
new system of parking is needed and
should be provided before a serious
accident occurs.
