RULING WILL BE MADE
ON CONTEMPT CASES

Superior, Wis., July 6.—(L. N. S.)—Long a thorn in the side of organized labor, the question of whether federal judges may continue to find guilty and sentence persons cited for contempt of court under the Clayton Act, is expected to be definitely answered by a decision, expected shortly, from the circuit court of appeals in Chicago, on an appeal from the decision of a Superior, Wis., judge, in a case growing out of the shopmen's strike last summer.

If the appeal is upheld, defendants in such cases in the future will be entitled to trial by jury. If not, the only alternative will be a fight in congress to obtain new legislation.

The case at issue is that of Sam Michaelson, et al, including ten former employees of the railway company at Hudson, Wisconsin, against the United States, ex rel., Chicago,

St. Paul, Minneapolis & Omaha Railway Company, in which the men were convicted of contempt by United States District Court Judge C. Z. Luze, of Superior. The A. F. of L. has interested itself in the case and has filed a brief supplemental to the appeal framed by Donald R. Richberg, counsel for the railway employees' department of the A. F. of L., who represents the convicted men.

Substantiation of the appeal by the circuit court, it is pointed out, would establish an important precedent. There would be small likelihood of convicting men of contempt of court in their own communities, where the populace usually is in sympathy with the strikers, it is hinted.

The appeal is based on a writ of error and was taken following denial of a new trial. The alleged errors were embodied in denial of a jury trial, "as provided by law," alleged insufficiency of evidence, the allegation that the court was without jurisdiction to impose sentences, and that in doing so the court was in error, for the reason that the sentence imposed was without warrant in law.

Chief discussion has centered on

denial of jury trial, considered the backbone of the appeal.

While the common law provides that punishment for contempt is entirely within discretion of the court, sections of the Clayton act specifically providing jury trial on demand of the accused are cited. The argument is made that congress obviously intended a departure from the common law in the section which reads "such trial may be by the court, or, upon demand of defendant, by jury."

Origin of the Ring.

residence property, would not be forced to put up fireproof structures.

The new ordinance will require all buildings erected after last night within the districts designated as within the fire limits, to be made fireproof, which means that they must be either of concrete or brick construction. protest. As the law stood a man could buy the livestock and feed them for almost a year and then the owner could step in and pay the city costs and interest and take the stock without any compensation to the purchaser. This is done away with as clear title is gained after 30 days.

The traffic laws were discussed at some length but no action was taken. The councilmen stated that inasmuch as a move is now on foot for uniform traffic laws in Oregon, Washington and California, it would be best to wait for a short time to see what is done. The traffic question, as to parking especially, is becoming serious in Grants Pass and it is felt that some changes are badly needed.
