FUNDS FOR SCHOOLS

The American system, considered
one of the best in the world, is
threatened by the increased tax bur-
dens being thrust upon the American
citizen, in the opinion of the Car-
negie Foundation for the advancement
of teaching. In the report it is ad-
vised that there be an elimination of
pupils, whose intellectual endowment
is ill-suited for formal study, and a
restricted curriculum.

The National Educational Associa-
tion meets the charge that the Na-
tion is now, or is likely in the future,
to spend "too much" on education,
with facts, in the face of which, it
contents, argument is hardly neces-
sary.

First asking these questions: "Is
there justification for the belief that
the cost of the public schools is enor-
mous and is sorely taxing the ability
of the American people to support
them? Do figures as to the cost of
education and the ability of the Na-
tion to pay for education support this
attitude?" The National Education
Association asserts that:

"The Nation in 1920 spent \$17 for
luxuries for every dollar that is spent
for education.

"It spent \$8.50 for other forms of
public service for every dollar it
spent for public elementary and sec-
ondary schools.

"The cost of all public elementary
and secondary schools in 1920 was
four-tenths of 1 per cent of the Na-
tion's wealth.

"The cost of all such schools in
1920 was less than 7 per cent of the
amount of money lying in the savings
accounts of the banks of the Nation
in 1921, a year of acute business de-
pression."

When the vast amounts of money
spent on warships, armies and other
equally unproductive functions of
government are compared with the
amounts spent for education, one is
struck by the small proportion which
goes to educate the youth of the na-
tion. As long as money can be
raised to fight wars and to build bat-
tleships, money can be raised to
build schools and provide teachers.
There is little need for fear that the
educational system of the United
States will ever be neglected on ac-
count of the lack of funds for carry-
ing on the work.

Los Angeles, July 7.—(I. N. S.)—
The trustful newcomers to Los An-
geles, who swarm here like bees
from every corner of the country and
abroad, are to have adequate protec-
tion from the well-known "slickers,"
professionally known as "business
chance swindlers."

Persons who have lived in Los An-
geles any length of time know either
by experience or through having
heard of an experience that the city
is full of these "slickers," who mulct
no less than \$1,000,000 annually
from the uninitiated who come here
and are unwise as to the many ways
he can be "maced for cool pieces of
eight."

Captain of Detectives J. D. Hunter,
of the District Attorney's office, has
undertaken a campaign, aided by De-
tective Roscoe Denny, to rid the city
of such undesirable dealers in so-
called "business chances," for the
protection of the unwary investor as
well as the legitimate brokerage of-
fices.

Many of these alleged "business
chance" operators are well en-
trenched in downtown office build-
ings, possessing apparently a genu-
ine reputation as to character. Coun-
ty officers have been able to make
but little progress in persuading of-
fice building owners and managers
to refuse to rent offices to such
brokers.

In order to obtain assistance for
this "house cleaning" Captain Hun-
ter has announced that he plans re-
questing the Los Angeles Crime
Commission to co-operate.

The District Attorney's office re-
ceives hundreds of complaints week-
ly concerning the swindling opera-
tions.

"There are numerous legitimate
business chance brokers in Los An-
geles," Hunter declared, "and these
deserve the protection of the Dis-
trict Attorney's office. It is the
crooked broker, and his number is
legion, that we are going after and
going to get. These fellows make it
a business to "salt" a garage, a paint
shop, a cigar stand, grocery store or
oil filling station to give it the ap-
pearance of prosperity. They then
will insert a "catch" advertisement in
the newspapers and sit back, like the
spider, for results.

"In his advertisement the broker
will state the prospecter need not
have experience in this line of busi-
ness—that the original owner will
teach him the business, which usual-
ly leaves the new business partner
stranded financially, and willing to
dispose of his 'white elephant' at
almost any price or abandon it en-
tirely."
