TOURIST REGISTRATION

Monday a tourist party arrived in Grants Pass from the coast. They had planned on stopping along the Rogue near this city for a week or more to take advantage of the fishing. They knew of the law which required the registration of foreign cars within 72 hours after entering Oregon. They wanted to comply with the law but were informed that the nearest place where such registration is possible is at Medford. That meant an additional 65 miles of travel. They were not going to Salem. There was no alternative left but to take the ride to Medford.

This is but a single instance of the inconvenience caused by not having such a registration at the junction of the two principal highways leading into Oregon from California. The tourist traffic from California is getting heavier over the Redwood highway and many of the travelers want to make a stay along the Rogue. The swimming and fishing here attract many and these should be encouraged to stay as long as possible as Grants Pass is trying to become a resort center.

There is talk of getting an assistant for the Medford registration station. Instead of sending an assistant to Medford, an office should be located in Grants Pass. All visitors to the state must go through the very center of the city for both highways traverse Sixth street. It would be an accommodation to a large number of tourists to have the station here and would inconvenience none of them.

NEW DRUG IS CLAIMED TO BE CURE FOR PARASIS

Lima, Ohio, July 10.—(A. P.)—Announcement that parietic patients at the Lima State Hospital will be treated with a new drug—trypanasol—has been made. It is claimed that its curative properties are substantiated by the fact that Dr. Charles H. Clark, superintendent of the hospital.

It was explained that parietic, an advanced state of syphilis, attacks the nerve centers of the brain and spine, inducing paralysis and, often, insanity. Ordinary drugs, it was stated, cannot be absorbed in the spinal fluid and are injurious when used near the brain.

That trypanasol will cure parietic in two months, through weekly injections, is the claim made by investigators and sponsors of the new drug.

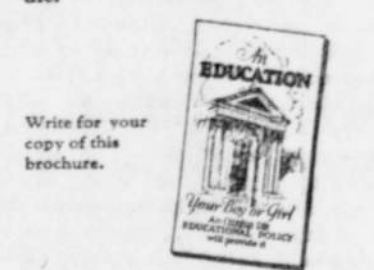
London, July 10.—(I. N. S.)—

The London season reaches its climax with Ascot week, which opened on June 18. This is the big society racing event of the year and English women and American and continental visitors plan to display themselves in their costliest garments during Ascot week. Last year Ascot was marked by a daily downpour.

Altogether it has been a freaky spring and summer in London. There have been but a very few days when winter overcoats were indispensable. There has been a great deal of rain, and to cap the weather climax there was a mid-summer fog during Derby week. London expects fogs in November, but not in June, and it's at a loss to explain the Derby week fog.

As an arbiter of styles the Prince of Wales seems doomed to failure. The Prince recently appeared in a blue derby hat. Thus far his lead has not been followed, and even the smartest "Berties" in Piccadilly and Bond street are clinging to their staid old "black bowlers."

English society has taken up Fred and Odette Astaire, the two young American dancers who have taken London by storm. When the Astaires opened in "Stop Flirting" they were an unknown quantity in London, but their success was instantaneous; even the undying enemies of revue, such as St. John Ervine and Sydney Carroll, sang their praises, and now the Astaires are the social toast of the town.

American tourists are champion pet collectors. The Savoy Hotel management announces that it has opened kennels for the reception of pets secured by Americans in Europe. These kennels, it is stated, have already housed monkeys destined for Milwaukee; great wolfhounds for Washington, D. C., and chameleons for Columbus, Ohio. Many parrots are cared for pending the voyage to America. It seems that ocean-bound vessels for the United States are going to resemble Noah's Ark.

There was a great sigh of relief sent up when H. H. Asquith made a solemn and public pledge that he would never write an autobiography. London has been surprised with biographies, and here they discovered a man with compassion for the long-suffering reader.

London, July 10.—(A. The bullion on the sunken vessel is said to amount to about \$5,000,000, and British engineers and salvage experts have undertaken to recover it.

Plan to Roof Over River.

A roof over the Chicago river ten miles in length, carrying boulevards, parks, garages and oil filling stations, has been proposed as the solution of Chicago's traffic problem. The roof would be 200 feet wide, of nine-inch concrete supported on concrete piling sunk into the river bed. On the roof would be two sidewalks, fifteen feet wide; two boulevards fifty feet wide, and a vacant space in the center seventy feet wide. The proposed plan would not interfere with river traffic as it would be constructed from twenty to thirty feet above the surface of the water.

Need Knowledge of Timber.

Nowhere is there a greater need for knowledge of timber growing than in the eastern states, says the forest service, United States Department of Agriculture. In this section the relatively dense population, the enormous industrial demands for timber, and the large areas of lands best fitted for forests all unite to urge timber production on a large scale.

New Rubber-Making Process.

An invention by means of which rubber is impregnated with nitrogen gas, thereby filling it with innumerable cells, may revolutionize the making of rubber. Ozonote is the name of the new product. A ball of it was subjected to a pressure of 32,000 pounds. In 24 hours it reasserted itself sufficiently to hit the ceiling when bounced from the ground. It is more buoyant than cork in water.

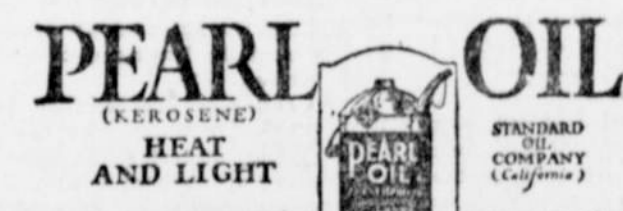
